An Introduction to Hate Crime

In 2015, people all over the world are still hassled, abused, attacked, victimised and targeted simply because of who they are. Many of these people will be victims of hate crime.

But hate crime isn't something that happens to other people, it can happen to any of us and it happens here in Bolton. Some people may be more likely to become a victim of hate crime, but we can all be affected by it.

Importantly, we all have a role in tackling hate crime. Our role could be in raising awareness of hate crime or encouraging more people to report it and access support. The Hate Crime Ambassadors Scheme aims to recruit motivated people from all walks of life to do just this. It is hoped that the Ambassador Scheme will create new opportunities for people to become informed about hate crime, be that while they are at work, at school, when they are at a club or pub, taking part in a leisure activity, at the gym, even on social media.

This scheme is important because we know that hate crime is underreported. This means that there is a lot more hate crime occurring than the police are currently aware of. We think more people will report hate crime if they know what it is and that the police want to hear about it. In fact, it doesn't even need to be a crime at all to report hate to the police. The police are just as interested in hearing about what are called hate incidents (like anti-social behaviour). PAGE 4

The Role of An Ambassador

Hate Crime Ambassadors are ideally placed to help in spreading the word and encouraging more people who experience hate crime to let the police know.

Being a **Hate Crime Ambassador** is an important role. It does not require a huge commitment of your time, but there are some things we would like to ensure that Hate Crime Ambassadors Do and Don't Do. In essence, we are asking for you to think about ways you can raise awareness of hate crime during your normal day. It could be something as simple as ensuring you mention it to friends if the subject comes up in conversation; or something more involved, like establishing a workplace policy on hate crime.

With no exceptions, if you experience or witness hate crime, get to a place of safety as soon as possible and contact the police at the earliest opportunity.

Do's and Don'ts

DO

- Inform friends, family and colleagues of what hate crime is; how it can be reported; and that the police will take all reports of hate seriously.
- Signpost anyone you know who may have been a victim or witness of a hate to places where it can be reported. This could be directly to the police, online via www.report-it.org.uk; or by visiting a third party centre.
- Where you can, share information, good news stories, and safety tips; identify ways to take part in hate crime awareness raising campaigns; formalise hate crime as a specific theme of your workplace policies. We will keep you informed of what is going on and ways to get involved.

DON'T

- ♦ Intervene or challenge anyone directly if you witness a hate crime occurring.
- Try to investigate or mediate in any instances of hate crime which you become aware of.
- Enter into discussions or arguments with individuals or groups who disagree with the police's efforts to tackle hate crime or who say things which are prejudiced or hostile.
- Purposely seek out individuals or groups (either in person or online) who you know may hold prejudiced or hateful attitudes to try and dissuade them from holding these views.
