Young people shared their ideas for the future at their own third annual Youth Vision Conference, to discuss the theme of "Prosperous Bolton".

Young people, from schools across the borough, shared their thoughts on how to improve aspiration, boost skills training and career choices, create a cleaner environment and encourage more children to take part in physical activity.

Teams then presented their ideas to a panel made up of councillors, head teachers and civic leaders.



£10m programme to repair Bolton's roads

Our borough's residential roads could be in line for a major cash boost of £10 million.

Much needed improvements to combat continued deterioration of residential roads would be paid for by a low interest £7m loan, funded by dividends from shares in Manchester Airport, together with 3m income received from capital receipts.

Each ward will receive an equal share of the pot - £500,000 – and councillors will work with highways officers to come up with a programme of work defined by engineering priority.

Leader of Bolton Council, Cllr David Greenhalgh, said: "We made a commitment to invest an additional £10m into our roads and that is why we want to create a new fund.

"Time and time again we hear that roads in our residential areas need urgent attention. We know that £10m will not fix everything but it will go some way to helping all of our communities across the town."

Deputy Leader of Bolton Council, Cllr Martyn Cox, added: "The state of our roads is an issue that affects everyone in our town as well as anyone who visits.

"It is an issue that is brought up regularly and we want local councillors to work with officers to ensure best value for money.

"The whole borough will benefit from this investment."

New measures to tackle antisocial behaviour in Bolton town centre are now in full force.

The Public Spaces
Protection Order (PSPO)
gives the council extra
powers to crack down on
inconsiderate behaviour.

However, support for those in genuine need is available. The council's housing team works closely with Achieve Drug and Alcohol Services, and charities voluntary sector partners including Urban Outreach.

A new homeless scheme is also being explored so people can donate money to help those genuinely in need.

Council leader, Cllr David Greenhalgh, said the crackdown was needed but stressed help is available.

He said: "We have a duty of care to the public and we know antisocial behaviour is putting some people off coming into town. We want to tackle behaviours which are causing issues for shoppers and businesses.

"Fining people is a last

The following activities are prohibited under the PSPO:

- Consumption of alcohol on street
- Ingesting, inhaling, injecting, smoking or otherwise using intoxicating substances
- Antisocial behaviour
- Begging on the street
- Peddling/street trading
- Soliciting for money in the street (commercial)
- Soliciting for money in the street (charity)
- Distribution of publicity materials
- Obstructing the highway
- Marking of surfaces such as walls or pavements
- Use of amplifiers/loudspeakers
- Use of skateboards and scooters within a specified part of the Prohibition Area
- Use of bicycles within a specified part of the Prohibition Area

resort, but everyone should now be fully aware of the new rules. There is a huge range of help available from the council and all our partners for those that need it and want to take it.

Executive Cabinet
Member for Environmental
Regulatory Services, Cllr
Anne Galloway added: "The

PSPO is not going to be used to target people who are sleeping rough or those individuals in genuine need.

"Through our partnership with excellent homelessness charities, like Urban Outreach, we will continue to ensure appropriate support is given to the genuinely vulnerable."

"Prevention must sit at the heart of everything that's done. We have to understand the reasons why people behave in certain ways and ensure we're putting in the right support. We welcome these powers will only be used as a last resort."

Multi-million pound plan for much-loved community service

Plans for a multi-million-pound investment in a valued community service have been unveiled.

A new state-of-theart day centre and community pool, as part of a comprehensive all age service, is to be built on the site of the former Firwood School off Crompton Way.

A £5m budget has been set aside for the project, which will be a successor to the Jubilee Centre.

The existing centre, which delivers day services for disabled adults, was built in 1983 and the building is showing significant signs of age.

It is currently operated by Bolton Cares, the

council-owned adult social care company.

The decision to relocate was made after a study revealed the Jubilee Centre could not be rebuilt in its current location on Tennyson Street without both disrupting the day service and restricting access to the pool.

Service users, carers and volunteers were asked for their views on two alternative sites during a public consultation.

Respondents agreed that the Firwood site would be more accessible for residents across the

borough and have improved car parking facilities.

As well as the new pool and day centre, the council will also consider broader plans for the future of the council owned Firwood site.

These proposals include adding a special school and integrated care facilities to create a campus style allage hub.

Bolton Council's Executive Cabinet Member for Adult Services, Cllr Andy Morgan, said:

"We know how popular the day centre and community pool are with service users.

"This major investment will allow us to upgrade to a new state-of-the art facility without construction work disrupting services at the Jubilee Centre in the meantime.

"In the future we want to use the extra space at the Firwood site to develop an all age hub, creating a one-stop shop for children, families and adults living with disabilities.

"The hub would provide fully-integrated care and support in the local community to help people live independent and fulfilling lives.

"This is a really exciting development and will ensure that the service will be fit for purpose for many years to come, providing current and future users with facilities that they rightly deserve."

IRON AN makes a spectacular show

Tens of thousands of athletes and spectators flocked to Bolton for the town's annual Ironman UK spectacular at the weekend.

This year saw the introduction of Night Run, a new 5k evening run, on Friday; the world's largest Ironkids race once again took over the town on Saturday, and the town welcomed Ironman UK for the 11th time in its 14-year history on Sunday.

"I really enjoyed the atmosphere.
I did a 5k the day before so I'm a bit knackered. I'm hoping to do an Ironman one day." - Night run first male - George Butler, aged 21, from Astley Bridge

Around 1,900 competitors from 42 countries swam, cycled and ran in the epic Ironman triathlon, finishing on Victoria Square.

Winner of Ironman UK was Brian Fogarty in a time of 9 hrs 27 min 12 sec. Brian, from Blackburn, dedicated the race to his uncle Brian who died 18 months ago.

Emma Wardall in 10hrs 39 min 48 secs was the first female winner across the line.

Bolton Council Leader, Cllr David Greenhalgh, said: "What a fantastic weekend with a real festival atmosphere.

"The weather held out for us, our spectators were brilliant and once again Bolton can be proud of hosting another successful international sporting event. Night Run was a brilliant community event and we believe it was the second largest across Europe, Africa and the Middle East. I'm delighted that it will be back next year.

"Ironkids was once again the world's largest and I am in awe of everyone who competed in Ironman.

"We are proud to host Ironman and already counting down to next year."

The Ironman weekend is worth around £4 million a year to the local economy and Bolton will continue to host Ironman UK triathlon until 2022. General entries for 2020 triathlon will be available online on **www.ironman.com/uk** on July 22.

Saving our high streets

Discussions have started about how to spend £16m of council funding to regenerate town centres across the borough.

Westhoughton, Horwich and Little Lever are all following the lead from Farnworth whose masterplan was approved in July.

Farnworth town centre has been selected to go forward to the second stage of the government's £675m Future High Streets Fund.

Steering groups made up of councillors, business leaders, and local key stakeholders have been tasked with drafting proposals for each of their town centres.

The four towns were promised a £16m cash boost earlier this year. And

work is now underway to put together masterplans in each area.

Each draft plan will be put forward for a public consultation to take into account local residents' views. A final masterplan will then be submitted to Bolton Council for approval.

Deputy Leader Cllr Martyn Cox, who has responsibility for regeneration, said: "We are focussing on what we want to achieve for town centres across the borough and £16m has been allocated to support the regeneration of Farnworth, Horwich, Little Lever

and Westhoughton town centres.

"Now that the steering groups are in place, we are hoping for real progress over the next 12 months.

"Who knows their area better than the local people, councillors and businesses from the area? When each area starts their consultation, it will be everyone's chance to give their views."

Progress on Bolton town centre masterplan is also ongoing – two planning applications for schemes in Church Wharf and Croal Valley were approved earlier this year.

A bid for £25m for Farnworth is through to the next round of the Future High Streets

future

Fund.

The council put forward a bid earlier this year for a share of the multi-million pound pot of cash to help improve town centres.

And the bid for Farnworth has been selected to go forward into the next stage of assessment.

The council will now receive a grant of up to £150,000 to help develop a full business case for the proposed investment programme.

The news came as the council's Cabinet approved the town centre masterplan, which sets out objectives and a new vision for the town centre.

Farnworth's masterplan includes a vision for a new community and civil hub in the heart of Farnworth, improved public realm, redeveloping the Market Precinct and extending the leisure centre.

Work will now begin to attract investors. A successful Future High Streets funding bid will help ensure key projects within the masterplan can be delivered.

Teveryday walking and cycling in Amsterdam

You can help to make walking and cycling safer in the borough by joining a group planning new routes and measures across the borough.

The Bolton Active Travel Forum was set up at the start of the year to make sure the borough makes the most of the £1.5bn planned investment to improve walking and cycling infrastructure in Greater Manchester.

It is made up of residents, councillors, council officers, health

organisations, walking and cycling organisations, and representatives from the team of the Greater Manchester

Walking and Cycling Commissioner, Sir Chris Boardman.

In December 2017, Chris and his team launched the 'Made to Move' strategy in Bolton Town Hall, the first step of which is to create a fully joined up cycling and walking network covering 1000 miles across Greater Manchester, with a requirement to be usable by a competent 12 year

old cyclist and by a pedestrian with a double buggy.

The Bee Network was launched in 2018 with initial funding of £160m of government money and a commitment to secure more for the future. So far 55 walking and cycling schemes across Greater Manchester have been approved.

"Sir Chris Boardman's brief is to make it easy and pleasant for anyone to leave the car behind and travel from anywhere to anywhere on foot, or by cycle," said Dr Grahame Cooper, a local resident and secretary to Bolton Active Travel Forum.

"As a resident I was among a group of walkers, cycle riders and others who campaigned to set up the post of commissioner and helped to set up the forum by working with the council's highways. Its aim is to make sure that as a borough we benefit from the funding that is available."

Councillor Stuart Haslam, Executive Cabinet Member for Highways and Transport, added: "Investing in this type of infrastructure reduces traffic congestion, improves air quality, physical and mental health, and saves healthcare costs, as well as improves the local environment and revitalises town centres and high streets.

"We need more people, from all walks of life, to be involved to build on the work that's been done, and help to make walking and cycling safer and easier across the borough."

In Bolton two schemes have so far been approved:

- A high quality walking and cycling route to Bolton town centre, running parallel to Chorley Old Road. The £1.5m project includes signed quiet routes, improved crossings and routes through parks and public spaces
- £4.1m proposals to create seven new crossings, several two-way cycle tracks on oneway streets and more cycle parking in Bolton town centre

Every death represents a tragedy for people's families, friends, neighbours and colleagues. Every suicide has the potential to be prevented. Talking honestly and openly about suicide has helped to save lives.

For Matt Moreton, the Chief Executive of charity The Sycamore Project, his personal experiences led him to launch a listening service for young people suffering from low mental

"My mental health journey is one that has not been easy or particularly pleasant," he said.

"I wanted to end the pain I was going through. I wanted to be 'healed' there and then - and the logic of my unhealthy mind said taking my own life would be the easiest and quickest way to be healed and end the journey.

"When I was told I had depression, I smiled. I discovered there was a reason why I felt like I did, that I couldn't just snap out of it, and that it was treatable.

You can get free one to one support, training, qualifications, work experience and help finding the perfect job through the Skills Support for Employment programme.

It is run by the council's Workshop and has supported hundreds of people. Free training is available to help with your confidence and employability skills, and work placements in a number of companies across Bolton, depending on what sector you want to work in.

So far around 1,300 people have gained sustainable employment.

Participants need to have a valid National Insurance number and be at least 19 years old. They need to be unemployed, either claiming or not claiming a benefit, and not in full-time education; or be working under 16 hours per week and Claiming Universal Credit; or have limited recent experience of employment and need skills or training which is stopping them finding work.


