Health leaders take up jab offer

Health leaders are urging us all to roll up our sleeves and get our annual flu jab.

Bolton Council's Executive Cabinet Member for Wellbeing, Cllr Susan Baines and Bolton's Director of Public Health, Dr Helen Lowey each received their flu vaccinations in early November.

Flu is a serious illness that kills thousands of people in the UK each year and places immense pressure on our health services.

COVID-19 and flu will be circulating at the same time this winter so it's more important than ever that we get vaccinated against both to protect ourselves, protect vulnerable people in the community and ease the strain on the NHS.

A flu vaccination dramatically reduces your chances of getting flu and spreading it to others.

Among those who are most at risk from flu are the over-50's, pregnant women, children and people with existing health conditions such as diabetes or COPD.

They are entitled to get a free flu

vaccination along with carers and health and care workers.

Anyone who is not eligible for a free jab can still get vaccinated at their local pharmacy for around £10 to £15.

Cllr Baines said: "Flu is a nasty, debilitating illness than can put vulnerable residents at serious risk.

"Getting a flu jab is a quick and easy way to protect yourself and those around you.

"If you've not had your flu jab yet please do your part to help keep Bolton safe and healthy this winter."

Dr Lowey said: "COVID-19 has not gone away and the virus is more likely to spread during the winter months.

"With both COVID and flu circulating at the same time this winter, there is a real risk that residents could be infected with

The scheme provides nutritious meals and rewarding activities during the school holidays, helping families who might otherwise struggle with the extra cost of food and childcare.

It offers a wide range of activities and is delivered with the support of a

network of charities and volunteer groups.

Over the summer holidays, 9,000 individual children accessed HAF services and enjoyed activities including skating, crafts and even cooking lessons with chefs at Bolton Food and Drink Festival.

Bolton's HAF programme has received excellent feedback from parents and was praised by the Department for Education on the way the scheme has been delivered.

Bolton Council's Executive Cabinet Member for Children's Services, Cllr Anne Galloway, said:

"This can be a very

expensive time of year and we are delighted to once again work with our partners in the community sector to give families some extra support.

"As well as a nutritious meal, children have the chance to build confidence by learning skills and making new friends.

"I have seen first-hand the positive impact that the HAF programme has made, and I am sure the team will deliver more of the same over the Christmas holidays.

"I urge families to visit the website and find out more about the opportunities on offer."

Sessions run for four days a week and are open to everyone, with priority given to those children on free school meals.

It takes a special person to become a foster carer - and with the right support and training, we can support every child who needs help.

If you are thinking about becoming a foster carer, then Bolton's Fostering Team is on hand to support you every step of the way. We can provide answers to those initial burning questions, giving you the best advice about what it takes to care for children as well as support you through the assessment process and beyond.

Why foster with your council?

Here are several good reasons why fostering with vour local council is the best choice.

- Fostering for your local council enables a child or children to remain in familiar surroundings, giving them stability when they are at their most vulnerable, for example, allowing them to attend their normal school.
- You're unlikely to have an empty bed for long as Bolton Council is a not-for-profit organisation and local authorities place children with their 'in house' foster carers first.
- You'll receive a regular competitive allowance, as well as other payments, to meet the child's needs.
- You'll have your own dedicated personal supervising social worker who will visit regularly and, if you need us, there is an on-duty team in the office, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.
- There's a full, training programme that continues long after you are approved, so you are always learning new skills.
- You'll be linked with an experienced buddy foster carer and invited to attend

regular support groups for carers and their children.

Social workers and others dedicated to the care of our looked after children all work for the council or our partner organisations. They follow the same policies and work

in the best interests of our children which helps to make things run smoother and easier.

There is no set time to apply to become a foster carer. We encourage and welcome applications all year round.

When you feel the time is right and you meet the essential criteria, why not get in touch?

If you feel a role caring for children and young people is important, you're aged 21 or over and have a spare room, then you've already ticked three of the essential boxes required to be a foster carer.

If you want to apply as a couple, you need to have been together for two years but you are welcome to apply as a single person as well.

Over 170 Community Champions protect our communities

But there is plenty of room for more!

It is so important that the communities where we live, work and study are given all the information they need to live a safe and healthy life.

Until recently, our Champions have been sharing information about COVID-19 but, as we move through the recovery phases, we are starting to share other important information that will help residents, students and people who work here thrive in their day to day life.

Do you live, work or study in Bolton? To be a Champion you don't need any experience and you don't have to

commit huge amounts of time, just being able to spend some time (no matter how little) helping us and sharing useful information with your networks - family, friends and colleagues. This can be as simple as sharing things on social media, chatting to your friends or putting up posters in local businesses.

As a Community Champion, you'll

be fully supported, have access to optional training and an online bank of materials. You can also ask for bespoke material to share with your networks. You will also have a single point of contact for everything.

We encourage Champions to feed back issues and concerns from the community so that we can act on them and give local people a voice.

What does it mean to you to be a **Community Champion in Bolton?**

The programme has allowed me to work with members of my community and talk to them about the importance of keeping safe to avoid getting infected by Covid-19.

My fellow champions and I have been concentrating on the various African churches as we know that a high proportion of our community will belong to a faith group and we've used the faith leaders to encourage getting vaccinated as well getting tested every week.

What have you done that you are proud of?

So far, it's the camaraderie between the champions and the networks we've established as we go around Bolton being Community Champions.

Having such a diversified community of Champions has allowed us to make inroads into the hardest-to-reach communities as we're able to talk to them in the most spoken languages of east, north, and southern Africa.

What would you say to other people who are thinking about signing up?

I would urge anyone who is thinking about it to do so immediately. Even the Bolton Mayor, Cllr Linda Thomas, has signed up and we visited her parlour recently to talk about our work as Champions in the community.

As well as helping one's community, family and friends, you also get to do training which is crucial to selfdevelopment and lifelong learning.

Improvements to roads and travel in Bolton

Many of our roads have been improved as part of a set of wider work within the Salford Bolton Network Improvement Programme (SBNI).

Work already completed as part of the programme includes Bridgeman Place and the CYCLOPS junction on Trinity Street.

More work on Trinity Street will start in early 2022 to improve access for pedestrians and cyclists and remove the existing vehicle drop off point.

The work is being delivered, using Local Growth Deal funding, by Bolton Council and Transport for Greater Manchester (TfGM).

Work on the roads around Bolton Interchange are almost

These improvements include:

- A new drop off/pick up facility for the train station
- Demolition of the redundant bus shelters outside the
- Construction of a drop off/pick up short stay parking facility for passengers.
- Remodelling of the existing taxi rank
- A cycle link between the recently completed CYCLOPS junction improvement at Newport St and Trinity St to the cycle hub outside Bolton Interchange

Active Travel

The council is developing plans to improve walking and cycling across Bolton via its Active Travel Scheme.

Under the scheme, residents are being consulted on

proposed Bolton Town Centre to Doffcocker link.

The proposed scheme has been developed as part of the Mayor of Greater Manchester's £160m Cycling and Walking Challenge Fund.

Improvements proposed include traffic calming measures and new and improved crossings to provide safer cycling and walking conditions at key intersections.

"Improving road safety for all road users - pedestrians, cyclists and motorists is at the heart of this scheme. It should also give the additional and much needed benefits of reducing traffic congestion and improving accessibility. As well as reducing congestion, journeys will be much more accessible and most importantly made safer for all."

Council invests in new, greener bin wagons

We're replacing our old bin waggons with a fleet of more efficient, reliable and greener vehicles.

The new wagons are fitted with the latest technology to limit CO2 emissions to become compliant with GM's Clean Air Zone.

They have better fuel consumption and are fitted with new 'pedestrian recognition' technology which makes them safer.

They also carry more waste in one load, 10 tonnes to be exact, so they're more efficient - which is great news for everyone!

There are 19 vehicles in total - some are already in use and the rest will be

in service next month.

Bolton Council's **Executive Cabinet** Member for Environmental Services. Cllr Nadim Muslim, said: "These new vehicles

will make a real improvement to our waste collection service.

"Our waste collection teams have done a great job working though the challenges of the pandemic, during which there has been a significant increase in demand for services.

"These new vehicles will enable us to provide an improved and more efficient service to residents."

Bolton Council's Executive Cabinet Member for Regeneration and Development, Cllr Adele Warren, said:

"This is a great step forward in our commitment to be a cleaner, greener, environmentally sustainable borough.

"These new vehicles will reduce carbon emissions and support our efforts to reduce pollution and deliver improved air quality in Bolton.

"Our vehicles will also be compliant with the requirements of the Greater Manchester Clean Air Zone."



We're on track to meet our climate goals



As delegates gathered for the COP26 climate change conference in November, we took stock of our progress towards becoming cleaner and greener and playing a part in the global fight against climate change.

In September, the council formally adopted its Climate Change Strategy, setting out key targets and priorities.

During a public consultation, you told us that you wanted to see more trees planted.

And we have committed to creating 15 hectares of new woodlands and, with our partner, City of Trees, we've planted 7.58 hectares with over 13,500 new trees across 11 sites in 2021.

You told us that renewable energy was another priority and we are making council buildings more energy efficient, with solar panels and air source heat pumps installed as part of the Public Sector Decarbonisation scheme.

Our Climate Strategy also reaffirms the council's commitment to working with community groups and voluntary organisations. Some of this work has been supported by Bolton's Fund, a voluntary sector grants programme.

£5,000 was ringfenced to encourage young people to engage with the scheme. Among the successful applicants was Bolton Youth Council, who won a grant to develop a swap shop.

Naomi Petho from Bolton Youth Council said: "As young people, we don't want tokenism. We have been really inspired that we've been supported to see through this idea and put this into action.

"We hope that these

swap shops will help expand young people's understanding of fast fashion and climate change."

Bolton Council's Executive Cabinet Member for Regeneration, Cllr Adele Warren, said:

"Bolton Council is proud to join other organisations, of all sizes, in committing to making greener choices and reducing our emissions. With the climate agenda in the spotlight like never before, now is a good time to take stock of the achievements we have already made and refocus on what still needs to be done."





Prepare for Clean Air in Bolton

The Greater Manchester-wide Clean Air Zone is coming to Bolton from 30 May 2022. It will NOT include private cars, motorbikes and mopeds.

You could be affected if you drive a heavy goods vehicle (HGV), van, light goods vehicle (LGV), bus, coach, taxi or private hire vehicle.

From 30 November, HGVs registered in Greater Manchester can apply for funding support. All other impacted groups can apply from January 2022.

Aiming to improve and modernise our services

Bolton Cares and the council are aiming to improve and modernise a wide range of services for older people and people with additional needs such as learning disabilities and autism.

The first step has been to gather views on what services people would like to see in the future and how to best deliver them.

An online survey and a series of face-to-face workshops in October and November gave almost 300 people the opportunity to have their say.

The next step is for an independent organisation, Community Catalysts, to collate all the feedback and then bring local people into working parties. The results will guide the review.

We've also invited other organisations, including Age UK Bolton, Bolton Dementia Support and Bolton Carers Support, to help with the project.

Bolton Council's Executive Cabinet Member for Adult

Services, Cllr Andy Morgan, said: "We think it's important that people can flourish through varied and fulfilling opportunities, like hobbies, employment, art, outings, leisure, learning, fitness and friendships.

"We understand that people have different interests and needs and want to do different things. That's why we want to offer a range of services that give people more choice in the activities they take part in and which help them to reach their goals.

"We're also aiming to make services available in ways that are more flexible, creative and convenient,"

The feedback gathered from the online survey and workshops will be shared this month, along with suggestions for how to improve services in the future.

Bolton's Fund helps build stronger communities

Bolton's Fund continues to support our outstanding charity and volunteer sector with more funding rounds planned for 2022.

Set up in 2019, Bolton's Fund is a voluntary sector grants programme delivered by the council, Bolton Clinical Commissioning Group, Bolton at Home and Bolton CVS.

Grants of varying size are made available across different rounds, with each round themed on a key priority for the Bolton community.

So far, the scheme has seen £1.8m awarded across 15 different rounds, dealing with issues such as digital exclusion, poor health and climate change.

Looking ahead, upcoming rounds will focus on tackling hate crime, making our communities safer and giving Bolton children the best possible start in life.

Full details for each round are published on the Bolton CVS website and application criteria varies depending on the size of the grants available.

Bidding is an open and transparent process with all decisions taken by an independent panel.

Bolton CVS is available to support charities and volunteer groups with their applications as well as offering a broader range of guidance and support to the sector.

CityFibre's full fibre mission in Bolton

We're building full fibre networks across the UK. Join the digital revolution, find out if you can connect today!



Who is CityFibre and what are we doing in Bolton?

We want to improve the UK's connectivity from the ground up literally! We're putting brand new Full Fibre infrastructure into the ground across Bolton, bringing the best available full fibre broadband to nearly every home and business.

This is a game-changer, enabling residents and businesses to benefit from ultra-fast internet speeds, stability, and reliability, whilst making the existing part-fibre, part-copper technology a thing of the past.

We were thrilled to attend the Food and Drink Festival and Farnworth Live Festival earlier this year and meet residents face-to-face. We're proud to be bringing better broadband to Bolton via our network and it has been great to be able to talk to you about what we're doing in your area and how it will improve everyone's connectivity.

Where are we working at the moment?

You will be able to spot our teams in action around Moses Gate and just north of Astley Bridge, as well as around Farnworth. Many homes can connect to Full Fibre in Farnworth now via TalkTalk, however more providers are joining the network shortly, which means more choice and flexibility. We aim to reach nearly every home and business across Bolton by 2023.

How does Full Fibre benefit me?

We know that across the Covid-19 pandemic, many residents in Bolton experienced poor connection, loss of connection, slow speeds, and a whole host of problems that made lockdown even more stressful. With Full Fibre, it doesn't matter if you have one device connected or a household full of connected devices, it doesn't matter whether it's 6pm and the whole street is online; if you pay for a 500Mbps, you get it.

How do I get it?

CityFibre doesn't provide broadband packages to residents, we only lay the fibre cable. Currently, TalkTalk is offering Full Fibre via our network, with speeds up to 500Mbps available. We're working to bring more internet service providers on board over the coming months, so that people in Bolton not only have better broadband, but better choice too.

If you live in Farnworth, there is a good chance you can connect to Full Fibre via TalkTalk today, call 0800 049 6253 to find out more.

The easiest way to check if you can connect is to use the postcode checker on the CityFibre website. If it's not available yet, you can register for updates, and once work is complete, CityFibre will email you a list of available Full Fibre providers.

Transforming services through digital innovation

We're at an exciting time in Bolton for all things digital.

Over the last few months, we've been developing a digital plan to help us do things like modernising the council, improving the services we provide, and supporting residents businesses and staff to get the training and support they need to be confident about going online.

We have a big programme to deliver, and have already made great progress, so far mostly behind the scenes to get our set-up right. This means that you'll be able to use our services more easily and flexibly in the future. One example is online payments - we've been setting up our systems to take payments digitally and, by Spring 2022, you'll be able to pay for a replacement bin or for a taxi licence application online, with other services following. This might seem a long way off, but we want to make sure that we get everything set up right to run smoothly.

There's also been a lot of work going on to help people to get online who currently aren't, maybe because of the cost, not being confident or not having a device. Our Libraries service has been running training to help

residents build skills, knowledge, and confidence. We're also working with Bolton College, Bolton at Home, Bolton CVS, and other partners to develop a support programme for residents to access devices and develop digital skills that local employers are looking for and to help them access services online.

These are some of the key things we're working on, and we'll be adding lots more over the coming months.

- Assistive technology to help people with care needs stay in their own homes for longer, for example providing falls alarms
- Moving application forms online so you can apply at a time to suit you and save yourself time and money by not having to print and post the form to us
- Publishing more useful information online
- We'll simplify the ways you can get in touch online
- Working with infrastructure providers e.g. to deliver better access to fast internet across the borough
- Working with employers to look at skills gaps and provide training to residents to meet those needs



Some of this work requires investment. It will also mean we're saving money by making things easier and quicker for you and our staff to do things digitally.

Everyone can download the free app from app stores to discover the best Bolton has to offer.

Key features of the app:

- Shopping and hospitality discounts and special offers
- Loads of community activities and events
- Culture, heritage and leisure activities
- Public announcements such as adverse weather, road closures and live updates



Leader of Bolton Council, Cllr Martyn Cox said:

"Many of us rely on mobile phones in our day-to-day lives, so to be able to access all this local information at the touch of a button, is fantastic."


