#### Commentary

In February 2021, Full Council signed off a revised Medium Term Financial Strategy and two year budget. This required a savings and efficiency programme, which, following consultation, identified £37.2m of savings to be delivered over the two year timeframe. A robust savings programme was established with a corporate steering group meeting monthly, and regular updates to ECM.

As of the end of the first year of the two year programme, 88% of the programme has been delivered. The remaining 12% of the programme has been scheduled and should complete in 2022/23.

#### Why is this measure important?

Business rates are the way in which businesses contribute to the cost of local services. As Bolton Council retain 98% of Business Rates, this measure allows the Council to measure the collection rate for a key income source for the Council.



#### Commentary

At the end of March 22, the total amount of business rates payable for 2021/22 was £78.0m. This is still lower than pre-covid years as there are still businesses that had reductions to support them in continuing to trade whilst recovering from the pandemic.

The collection rate at the end of March 22 was 93.08% compared to 89.40% at the end of March last year – so a good improvement. Overall though collection rates are still lower than they would normally be as we have still not resumed all of our pre-covid recovery action processes. The business rates team are also continuing to provide some covid grants to businesses and are currently implementing a new covid relief scheme (CALF) to help businesses who haven't qualified for any of the previous covid reliefs. They are also still working hard to clear backlogs of correspondence and changes to customer records that have built up since last year.

The team are carrying out all usual processes around recovery action whilst still making arrangements with people who are struggling to pay.

The total amount of council tax payable for 21/22 at the end of March was £148.6m and we had collected £140.3m of this. This accounts for 94.44% of the total charged and compares to 94.78% collected at the end of March last year.

#### Commentary

In July 2019 the DfE published the School Sport and Activity Action Plan. This Action Plan was a joint commitment to ongoing collaboration at national level to ensure that sport and physical activity are an integral part of both the school day and after-school activities. Opening School Facilities Funding supports this commitment, and The Active Lives Team in the Public Health directorate supported the delivery of this programme across Bolton. Our role is to provide support and guidance to schools to help deliver after school provision, linking in with local clubs and groups and support schools to help open or reopen their facilities to the local community, as local evidence suggests that schools are community hubs where people feel safe and are a key asset. 14 local primary and secondary schools have been successful with this funding, so far we have supported at least one club or group to utilise each of these school facilities.

One of our pilot schools was St Thomas in Halliwell, where we have supported the school in making changes so their facilities can be accessed easily without the school's support. This includes gated access, changes to alarm panels and storage options etc. The local area is densely built up, with no open space and busy roads- parents noted that the school could be used for young people to play in. To eliminate the school's concerns around opening the site unsupervised, we are in the process of supporting the parents' group to set up as a voluntary group and take ownership of this space free of charge, and in time to apply for funding to
