

Waste Management & Neighbourhood Services Street Cleaning Consultation - Frequently Asked Questions

1) Why are we proposing these changes to street cleansing?

All parts of the council are required to contribute to total budget savings of £37.2m for the period 2021-2023. As part of efforts to meet this target, the Waste and Neighbourhood Services team is consulting on proposals that would reduce the cost of street cleansing by £270,000 per year.

2) What street cleansing services does the council currently provide?

- Mechanical road sweeping and pavement sweeping
- Emptying and maintaining litter bins
- Removal of fly-tipping
- Street sweeping in town centres
- Weed spraying
- Removal of offensive graffiti
- Removing items such as dead animals and debris from road traffic collisions.

3) Will my street be less clean? How will this affect me, my family or business?

We do not expect streets to be less clean. The council's well-established street cleaning teams have a lot of local knowledge and a good understanding of the times and places that are likely to need cleaning. The proposed new setup will give them the flexibility to work at the locations that need it.

4) Will we still have litter bins in our town centres and on main roads?

Yes. There are no proposed changes to the current number of litter bins.

5) What will happen in town centres on weekends and on bank holidays?

It could take us a bit longer to clean town centres, although this will still be done in the mornings.

6) Will these changes affect the way my wheeled bin is collected?

No, your wheeled bin collection will not be impacted by the proposed changes. A completely different team collects wheeled bins.
