This year will see several major developments come to fruition as part of ongoing plans to improve the town centre and the borough. Although the economy still remains difficult, projects funded with about £100m of private sector investment are set to open. In this edition of Bolton Scene we provide an update of what's happening.

- **Opening of Logistics** North, the largest distribution, logistics and employment site in Greater Manchester with Aldi's new distribution centre fully operational.

• Opening of the new Bolton Interchange linking buses with trains.

- Opening of a new £6.5m office block, Bolton Central fronting Great Moor Street as part of the interchange development.
- £3m regeneration of Newport Street with new paving and street furniture and upgrading the shop fronts.

Further planning for Rivington Chase, the residential and employment scheme at the site of the former Horwich Loco-motive Works, and for the Academic Village in the town centre will also take place. The academic village forms part of a university masterplan which will enhance its facilities, to take account of plans for major growth during the next 10 years. Inside we give a round up what is happening in the town centre and around the borough.

Protecting the vulnerable with less money

Since the government started to reduce its funding to local authorities in 2010, the council has made £100m of savings, and we will have saved a further £43m by 2017. The government has also said that by 2020, they will introduce further changes to how councils are funded. In this edition of Bolton Scene we look at what has been done so far and what is to come.

IN the past five years, local councils across the country have seen decreases in their budgets and there's still more to come. When the full council meeting in February 2015 agreed savings of £43m this was on top of £100m that had already been found.

During this time the council has tried its hardest to protect vital services, while still providing support for the most vulnerable.

We've tried to protect front line services for as long as we can, through savings in accommodation, procurement and reducing management and administration costs. But with further savings to come, and to continue protecting those

vulnerable people, we need to look at how we provide services differently.

budget The council's comes from three main sources – but the only part we directly control is the amount of council tax we raise. Back in 2010, around 25% of the budget came from council tax, with the rest coming from what the council received from government grants, and a share of the business rates raised in Bolton.

The government decided how much grant and business rates to give to each

In the past five years the amount of government grant has been cut back, and there have been some changes to business rates. This means that around 40% of our budget now comes from council tax, and 60% from government grants and business rates. The

government announced in December that by 2020, councils will no longer receive a government grant but will be allowed to keep all of the business rates raised in their area. Based on today's figures, this would mean a significant loss. So the council needs to prepare for a much reduced budget in future.

Unlike a business, the council isn't allowed to borrow money to run services - so it has to match how much it spends with how much it earns.

Closing the funding gap just by raising council tax isn't possible - a 1% rise in council tax brings in around an extra £1m, so to replace the loss of grants would require a huge rise.

The council therefore needs to make savings and to look for new sources of income.

New Chief Executive



THE council's new Chief Executive Margaret is Asquith.

She has worked at Bolton Council since 2006 as Director of Children's Services and then as Director of the merged Children's and Adult Services department. Most recently she was Deputy Chief Executive.

"During the last 10 years I've got to know many colleagues, members and partners. I know that the council has many strengths to build on and that we are capable of meeting the challenges we continue to face.

"My role will be to lead the council and continue to work with staff and partners to deliver our strategic priorities.³

Margaret's role includes overseeing the current round of savings reviews as part of the budget for 2015-17.

Investing in the future

DESPITE the need for making savings when it comes to running services, the council is able to make one-off investments.

This is called capital funding and the money comes from the one off sale of assets or the dividends from Manchester Airport.

It's a bit like when you are buying or renting a house you use your wage to pay the mortgage - this is similar to the council using government grants, business rates, and council tax revenue, while a lottery win could be used to buy extras capital funding. You wouldn't want to rely on winning

money on the lottery every month to pay your mortgage or rent.

In the same way the council can't rely on selling assets and getting dividends from the airport to run services every year.

Money that comes from sale of assets or from dividends can only be used for oneoff projects and not for ongoing running of council services.

The budget report sets out one-off funding for the year ahead:

- £2.5m, announced as part of £5m last year, is invested in Highway maintenance schemes including residential roads and pavements
- £1m is invested in aids and adaptations to people's homes to improve their qual-ity of life and enable them to live independently longer
- To provide an additional £1m for improved street lighting within the borough
- An additional £0.5m for the Community Empowerment Fund for the voluntary and community sector
- £1m for improvements and additional facilities at Bolton One
- £1m to repair and provide additional flashing road speed warnings
- £1.5m for new 3G pitches in the borough
- £0.5m to develop free breakfast clubs in primary schools




THE council is changing its structure and number of departments so as to better meet the needs of the borough in the future with the limited resources available.

The current Director of Environmental Services and Director of Development and Regeneration are both due to retire. These posts will be combined and replaced with a new single post of Director of Place.

The combined post of Director of Adult and Children's Services and Deputy Chief Executive will be replaced with a new post - Director of People.

The changes will see the number of top management posts in the council reduced from 21 to 17.

Savings 2010-15

BETWEEN 2010 and 2015, the council saved more than £100m from what it spent. Priority was given to projects which drove efficiencies in management & administration. Examples of the ways in which savings were found include:

- £1.75m from review-ing our accommodation across the borough - reducing the number of buildings we occupy, making our properties as efficient as possible, and sharing them with other
- organisations.Restructuring of services and reduction in management posts, including £1.25m saved from reducing senior management
- Savings from parks and open spaces, street clean-ing, public toilets and ground maintenance
- £500,000 savings from leisure services
- Changes to the libraries service to save £500,000 by changing five smaller branch libraries to neighbourhood collection points
- Savings of £600,000 from housing services.
- £800,000 from bringing the Adults and Children's together departments into a single department. and merging their support services.
- New arrangements for waste collection aimed to save at least £2.6m.
- Changes to services provided at Children's Centres to save £1.5m
- Sharing IT services with Wigan Council, to save more than half a million pounds

Progress on the two-year budget

By 2017, the council needs to have saved another £43m from its budget, on top of the £100m saved over the past 5 years.

The council approved a budget last year for the two years from 2015 to 2017. This gave time to work out the detail of the savings proposals which were outlined in the budget, and to plan for how they'd be delivered. At the recent council meeting on 24 February, the budget report gave an update about progress, as well as setting out some more detail on a range of one-off funding which the council has created to support key areas of work.

New adult social Message from the care company takes shape

PLANS to create a new company to deliver adult social care in the borough are a step nearer completion.

The council's Cabinet approved proposals to set up the not-for-profit company earlier this year. The council has to make £43m of cuts by 2017, with the adult social care department contributing £7.75m. This is on top of £100m cuts to the council's budget since 2010. The company will be

called Bolton Care and Support Ltd and is expected to save the council around £3.5m each year. Services that will transfer to the company include: supported living services; disability day care; older adults day care; extra care services and the shared

lives service. Around 400 employees are expected to transfer to the company on April 1, although some may opt for voluntary severance or early retirement.

Staff are in the process of discussing their options with the council and are being taken through the new terms and conditions.

The council has carried out extensive consultation about the changes with employees, trade unions, service users, their families and carers, and has considered their comments carefully before finalising the details.

Deputy Leader of the Council, Cllr Linda Thom-as, said: "We have to make considerable cuts across adult services due to reductions in government funding and we decided to explore the creation of an arms-length social care company as a realistic alternative to outsourcing a route that some other authorities have taken. We also made a commitment to protect services to our

most vulnerable residents; therefore cutting these services was not an option.

"After months of negotiating with staff and trade unions, we are now at the stage where we are ready to move forward with the new company. New employees will benefit from competitive terms and conditions existing employees and have a number of options to suit their circumstances. We value our employ-ees and the work that they do, and together we intend to make this a successful company that will deliver excellent care to those who need it most."



Councillor Cliff Morris

Welcome to the Spring edition of Bolton Scene, the council's newspaper.

At this time of year, much attention is focused on the council's budget for the coming year, and the level


of Council Tax. Council approved a two-year budget in February 2015, when we thought we'd need to save around £43m between 2015 and 2017 because of ongoing reductions in government funding. We've made good progress, but it has involved some difficult decisions.

The council also has to set the Council Tax for the coming year. Last year, we took a decision to freeze Council Tax. This year, we also had to make a decision about the new Social Care Levy, a new charge the Chancellor introduced in the November budget, separate to any increase in council tax, to help fund ris-ing costs of social care. Our forecast suggests by 2021, this could cost an extra £9m every year, mostly because we are providing care to more people than ever, as we live longer and need more looking after. Even after doing

everything we can to prevent, reduce and delay the need for care, we think our social care costs will rise by about £3.7m this year. Opting for the full 2% social care levy will raise £1.8m - a shortfall of about £1.9m this year.

The final decision by the council was to take the full 2% social care levy to do as much as possible to meet the costs of caring for our vulnerable elderly residents; and to increase council tax by 1.5%. We realise that this will not be easy for many of our households, but felt it was the only choice if we are to continue to protect our most vulnerable citizens.

We do have more flexibility around capital funds one-off amounts of money
and you can find details on page2, of schemes we have introduced to improve the environment, invest in leisure, and support local voluntary and community groups.



The current trend shows that around 250 more adults are receiving social care from the council every year. By 2020/21 that will be 1000 extra people, which will cost an extra £9m per year to provide services.

Health and social care under one roof

PLANS are well under way to transform the Winifred Kettle Centre in Westhoughton to bring together a range of health and social care services under one roof.

The council is working with NHS Bolton CCG and Bolton NHS Foundation Trust to turn it into an integrated neighbourhood base for a number of community health and care services.

Work is being carried out at the property to remodel the rooms inside in order to provide a base for the local district nursing team, the health visitor teams and the integrated neighbourhood team. It's Bolton's new approach to delivering health and social care services to

our most frail and vulnerable residents. It will also see a brand new district nursing treatment room service, enabling residents to access clinical assessment for a wide variety of wound care issues, including leg ulceration, injection administration and other therapeutic services currently not avail-

ough. There will also be spare

able in this area of the bor-

office space for a voluntary sector partner to use in the future.

The renovations are on track so that the first teams can move into their new home within the next few months, and this includes around 11 health visitors and 15 district nurses who are currently based at Westhoughton Clinic.

Winifred Kettle is also home to an Older Adults Day Care Service on the ground floor, which has temporarily moved to Daisv Hill Community Centre while the work is being carried out.

It is expected that the building will be fully operational, with all major partners settled in, later this year.

The Deputy Leader of Bolton Council, Cllr Linda Thomas, said: "Our integration plans in Bolton are moving at pace and we are working with our partners to provide a range of services, aimed at supporting the most vulnerable residents in the Westhoughton community, from one central base.

"I am pleased to see that these plans for Winifred Kettle are well under way and it won't be too long before everyone is settled in and making use of the facilities.'

The only plastics we can recycle in your burgundy bin are plastic bottles such as:



Why we can only recycle plastic bottles?

We know it can be confusing when we are all trying to recycle more. However, there are really good reasons why we can only recycle plastic bottles in Bolton.

- 1. Manufacturers that make new products demand high grade plastics such as plastic bottles. Your yoghurt pots, margarine tubs and plastic trays are made using a low grade plastic and at the moment there is no market in the UK for these items.
- 2. Our sorting machines do not sort between different plastic items. This means that the low grade plastic pots, tubs and trays contaminate the high grade plastic bottles.

What should I do with my plastic tubs, pots and trays? Your plastics pots, tubs and trays don't go to waste. Put them in your grey bin and they will be turned into green electricity.

Don't forget you can recycle your glass bottles and jars, food and drink cans, foil and foil trays in the burgundy bin.

There's no butt about it

A water butt collects all that lovely rain, so that you can give plants a free drink. Plants love rainwater, so there's no need to waste your tap water.

In partnership with United Utilities we are offering 1,000 residents the opportunity to save water by reusing their old 240 litre grey bin as a water butt.

Foster with Bolton

The council always needs foster carers to look after our vulnerable children. In particular it needs people to come forward to look after teenagers and groups of brothers and sisters. For this edition of Bolton Scene we spoke to Pam and Alan Lace who have been foster carers for 14 years. They were already parents to three boys when they decided to apply. During that time they have looked after more than 20 children. Here's their story – names of the children have been changed.

THE council is very committed to fostering and achieving the best possible outcomes for children who can't live with their birth families.

Children's services teams work very hard to enable children to keep living within their own families whenever possible.

Children need to be looked after by the local authority for all sorts of reasons. These include death of parents, domestic violence, parental alcohol or drug misuse and abuse.

There are several types of foster care placements:

- If you become a short term foster carer you will look after a child with a view to that child moving on. This may be back to family, to an adoptive placement or into a long term foster placement
- Long term fostering. Adoption is not appropriate for every child and some children may not be able to return home or go to other family members. When this is the case children may need long term foster carers to provide stability and a caring and loving family environment until they reach independence
- Family and friends fostering. This is short term or permanent foster care offered by people related to or previously known to a child
- Enhanced Fostering. This is foster care provided by highly skilled and experienced foster carers. We ask them to look after children with complex health, behaviour or disability needs and, because of this, we offer a higher level of financial reward

"The most rewarding thing we have ever done"



"Fostering has been the most challenging but also the most rewarding thing we have ever done,"

"It's something that I have considered since being quite young but Alan didn't think about it until we discussed it together. I worked as a nurse but decided I wanted to devote my time to fostering and I love it." said Pam.

"After hearing first hand from my mother Eileen about what it

was like growing up in a children's home, I knew I wanted to do everything I could to make the youngsters I fostered feel like part of the family.

Listening to what mum went through had a massive impact on our decision to foster. Alan and I feel that young people in care are society's responsibility — not just the government or Social Services.

"After discussing it at length with my husband, we contacted the council's Children's Services and asked them to send us some information.

"After the initial enquiry process, we began the preparation classes, which we really enjoyed and that made us hungry to get started. We then went to a panel who rubber stamped everything and within a couple of weeks we had our first placement. Wherever possible, the council will place Bolton children with Bolton families, so they're never too far away from home, school and friends.

"We were determined that the children we looked after would not experience anything like my mum had. We always try to find out as soon as possible, prior to a child coming to us, what their favourite toy, cartoon or TV show is, or what their interests are, we will then try to personalise their room by putting posters up, using character bedding or make sure they have a treasured toy with them wherever possible through liaison with the child's social worker.

"We first welcomed Rachel, then aged five, to our home in 2001. Rachel was the first child that we fostered and she's still with us now aged 19.

"Rachel more was interested in the dogs than us at first. She presented us with very challenging behaviour initially, but love, with consistency, fantastic support from our link social worker the child's social worker and all the training, Rachel is as much a part of the family as our boys, and is invaluable in supporting us help settle in other children and young people. "Three years after Rachel arrived, her sister Claire, now 17, came to us, and she also is still with us. We also have two other young people

in long-term placements, James aged 16, and Melanie aged 10. "Initially we did worry about the kinds of challenges we would face, but you get an abundance

but you get an abundance of information beforehand from Social Services and there has never been a child that we have said no to.

"The department also facilitate support group meeting for carers, there is an ongoing programme of training, a buddy system which allows foster carers to support each other and there is always someone on the end of the phone to lend a helping hand when you need it. The key is to never be afraid to ask for help or advice.

"Recently James involved was in а very ΤV challenging programme with Bear Grylls which is being aired at the moment. he is also a great footballer and cricket player; Clare has always done well at school, and with horse ridina.

She is now doing very well in a full time apprenticeship; Rachel, we discovered, is a fabulous swimmer. She now works full time as a beautician and has

matured into a confident, independent and beautiful young woman; Melanie is also an accomplished horsewoman and her self-confidence grows month by month, she moves over to secondary school this year and we look forward to seeing her achievements as she grows into a young woman.


"The role is not all plain sailing though and sadness sometimes comes with the territory.

One time in particular, involved a young boy we fostered for a couple of years, his parents could not look after him and, whilst we would have loved to have continued to care for him (or maybe even adopted him) many members of his extended family came forward to take him in.

This outcome is undoubtedly a positive thing for him, and it is right that any child should stay within their family if at all possible — this was one of the hardest things we have had to deal with.

"Despite these difficult times, we would not change our decision to become foster carers. The rewards outweigh the challenges. It has helped that we have strong support from our family and our sons."



Curtains up for plans

The Octagon Theatre's ambitious plans for redevelopment have taken a step forward with further funding announced.

The Market Place is undergoing a £19m refurbishment by owners Moorgarth Group.



The shopping centre has also announced plans for a new playzone. The playzone will include a indoor recreation space and climbing wall, an 18-hole adventure golf course, a 43 metre model railway, a new café and special party zones which will be able to be booked for events.



be submitted in late 2016.




Logistics North

Residents opt to slim bins

LAST July, the council approved the introduction of slim grey bins, to save £1.25m a year and increase recycling levels.

The council has already made significant efforts to reduce grey bin waste and increase recycling. but must make further changes, as waste disposal costs have increased from £16m in 2011/12 to £20m in 2014/15. Most Greater Manchester councils are taking steps to reduce waste disposal costs, either

The council will therefore be replacing all 240 litre grey bins with slim 140 litre grey bins between June and November 216, but there will be no other changes to collection rounds or days for residents.

More than 4000 residents now have a slim grey bin and the council asked a group of volunteers to keep a diary to see how they managed with the new bin.

Another resident who was happy to switch to a slim grey bin was single mum, Shelley Duncan who lives with her children Macie 8, and Jaxon 4, in Westhoughton.

Shelley previously recycled her plastic bottles, paper and glass, but there were

a few items she was not sure about recycling, such as shampoo bottles and baby wipes, which were easy to check by asking for a waste audit from the council's waste and recycling team. Shampoo bottles can be recycled in the burgundy bins and baby wipes are not recyclable and have to go in the grey bin.

Shelley had not previously recycled food and had always found that her bin was full on collection day.

However, she decided that the switch to a slim bin was a good time to introduce food recycling in the home.

"The kids have really enjoyed learning about the different types of recycling you can do in the home and now they know exactly what type of waste goes in which bin.³

She added: "Previously my grey bin was pretty full on collection day and also heavy to move. Now, it's not usually full except at Christmas or after a family party and its much lighter for me to put out for collection."

Anju Lilley, from Westhoughton, was concerned when she heard about the introduction of slim bins, as she has five children and already recycles a lot.

However, after a call to the council's waste and recycling team, she was reassured that families of six or more would be allowed to keep their larger grey bin, as long as they are recycling.

Anju has always recycled and was taught about recy cling at home and school, as a child. She was brought up in a culture of upcycling and she has also brought her children up to understand recycling in the home.

Anju said: "It's easy to make recycling a part of your everyday life and fairly simple to understand what to put in the different bins, as even my younger children can do it.'

She is happy that she will be able to keep her large grey bin, as despite recycling as much as possible the family of seven does find that the bin is pretty much full by collection day.

The council wants to encourage any residents who feel they need help with waste and recycling to apply for support.

Large families with six or more people, families with three or more children in nappies and households with one or more people producing medical waste can apply for a waste audit and may be eligible for a larger bin, as long as they are recycling as much as they can

Bolton Council Executive Cabinet Member for Environmental Services Cllr Nick Peel said: "It is great that people like Susan, Shelley and Anju have put themselves forward for these

case studies. "We hope that other families and house-holds will see from these case studies that it is possible to manage with a slim bin. All of our case studies have found that if they are all recycling fully, including food recycling, that they can reduce the amount in the grey bin.'

Bolton in brief

RECYCLE DONATION: Recycle for Greater Manchester and Viridor have donated 13 tonnes of Revive Multi-Purpose Compost to Bolton community organisations, in the last year, to help them grow fruit, vegetables and plants.

ELECTRIC CARS: Electric vehicle use in Greater Manchester has rocketed over the past twelve months. Transport for Greater Manchester (TfGM) developed more than 300 charging points and during 2015 there were 28,744 charging sessions compared to 10,174 in 2014.

STEAM MUSEUM: Bolton Steam Museum is open the Bank Holiday weekend Sunday 1 and Monday 2 May, and Sunday 29 May and Monday 30 May and 10am-4pm. Free admission to the museum on Mornington Road behind Morrisons. Volunteers have rescued and restored 30 old stationary steam engines - some of the engines which once powered the cotton mills of Lancashire.

AT SEA: Bolton Aquarium celebrated 75 years earlier this year. The popular attraction which welcomed 100,000 visitors last year, has more than 70 varieties of fish from all around the world. It opened in 1941.

MORE BOOKS: Bolton library users can borrow books from other libraries across Greater Manchester. Libraries in the region have launched a shared online catalogue system giving access to 2.8m million books and other items using their existing Bolton Libraries card.

IRON KIDS: Places are running out for the world's largest Ironkids. The race, takes place on Saturday, July 16. To enter complete an entry form at www. ironkids.co.uk. The fee is £3 per child.

PLAY AREA: Six-year old Thomas Webb was guest of honour when a vandalised play area was redeveloped. Thomas offered to donate all the money from his piggy bank when the play area in Suffolk Close Park in Little Lever was damaged.

ELEPHANT LINKS: The council has started work on a new town centre play area, which will reflect the town's historic links with elephants. The new play area will be situated in Octagon Court and includes a large multi-use play structure with climbing frames and a slide, as well as two elephant-shaped rockers.

College apprentice turns life around

A BOLTON College student has received national awards for his efforts to study and to turn his life around.

Connor Stevenson is currently completing a Level 3 Apprenticeship in Teaching and Learning Specialist Support for Schools at the college.

He was nominated for the Association of Colleges Student of the Year at the National Apprenticeship Awards after being identified by Bolton College as an exceptional apprentice. He works as an apprentice youth worker at the Raise the Youth Foundation.

The foundation, works with 'high risk' young people, including gang members, ex-offenders, substance abusers and looked-after children to enable them to make positive changes to their lives.

Connor, 24, said: "I used to get into trouble with the police but this apprenticeship has given my life stability, so to get national recognition from the Association of Colleges and the National Apprenticeship Service is just amazing. This whole experience has helped me realise my goal: to help young people channel their emotions through music. I'd love to be a music teacher one day."

What sets Connor apart from other teaching support apprentices is his approach; if a learner is proving difficult to motivate, he engages them through music, which then focuses them to work on their functional skills.

Ian Hepplewhite, Co-founder of Raise the Youth Foundation, said: "Before joining us, Connor was long-term unemployed and involved in varying levels of substance misuse, criminality, and antisocial behaviour, and was distant from the labour market. But his passion for music was his hook into learning. Connor has worked hard to overcome life challenges and academic challenges – but the greatest testimony is his ability to motivate others to learn.

He engages, encourages, motivates, listens – and uses his sense of humour, his boundless energy and his personal story to energise others. We're all incredibly proud of him."

Lighting up the streets

MORE than 1300 streets in Bolton have been switched over to new LED lighting.

over to new LED lighting. The scheme won an award in the Lux Awards a flagship lighting industry competition - to recycle the existing old style sodium street lanterns with Lumicom, a not-for-profit recycling company.

Around 5750 street lights are now using the lower energy lighting and approximately 26,000 street lamps on residential streets and main roads are being replaced with lower carbon LED lanterns during the next three years.

The street lighting programme should save the council £14m over 20 years, and reduce energy use by around 50%.

The new LEDs are also brighter and keep the streets well lit and safe for pedestrians, cyclists and drivers, reducing the chance of accidents and crime. They also improve the quality of images captured at night on CCTV. The LED lighting is con-

The LED lighting is controlled by a wireless Central Management System allowing the lights to be monitored from a central point, which reduces inspection costs and make it easier to repair faults. This system also enables lighting levels to be varied accordingly.

And she directs Bolton Youth Harmonies, a senior youth choir which caters for ages up to 19. Carolyn has recently helped to set up the new charity Trust Music which supports children in challenging circumstances to access music.

The busi-ness owner Rachel Husband runs a range of taught workshop style sessions aimed at different groups. She also runs drop in sessions and caters for birthday parties and other special events. Poppins Tearooms is a Victorian styled tea room at 142 Lee Lane and offers a unique dining experience for customers, providing a range of luxury teas, herbal teas, coffee and cold drinks, sandwiches, cakes and pastries. The atmosphere created is of a traditional English Tearoom with chandeliers and wall lights, church pews, white tablecloths and an old bike outside with flowers in its front basket with small touches relating to Mary Poppins.

The latest shop to move in is M&O fishmongers which has opened for business at 60 Lee Lane selling a variety of fresh fish, seafood and game. The business owners have wanted a shop in their home town for some time after trading in Chorley and Darwen for the last few years.

 Forever Home Interiors were awarded a grant of £5000 in early January and at the time Bolton Scene went to print the owner was refitting the shop at 64 Lee Lane before opening. The business sells solid wood furniture, accessories, upcycled shabby chic furnishings and giftware.

PLANS for the new Horwich Leisure Centre have taken a step forward with the release of architects drawings.

The concepts have been produced to go with a planning application which is due to be submitted later this month.

As the council announced last year the current leisure centre is to be replaced with a brand new facility which will include:

- 25m six lane pool with a separate training pool
- 100 station fitness suite
- Spin and dance studios
- Four court sports hall
- Changing facilities New car parking

In addition a new health facility will be built on the site.

If approved, work to demolish the current car park would take place after the Horwich Festival of Racing in June. The new centre would then be built on the site of the car park. The current centre would remain open and temporary car parking would be put into place

When completed the old centre would then be demolished and a new car park and GP surgery built, subject to a further planning application.

If approved the new centre will open in summer 2017 with the car park and GP surgery opening in 2018.

The new centre will provide a range of modern facilities within a brand new purpose building," said Councillor Cliff Morris, Leader of the council.

'The current building is well used and popular but is looking tired after 40 years service. The new facilities will provide the west of the borough with a sporting centre to match that available in the town centre at Bolton One."
