You are an Ironman!

Fabulous crowds, sunshine, and a great Bolton welcome greeted more than 2300 athletes competing in this year's Ironman UK triathlon.

A drizzly start didn't dampen the spirits of the competitors as they gathered at 6am to start the gruelling event. A 2.4 mile swim around Pennington Flash in Leigh, was followed by 112 mile cycle ride through the Lancashire countryside where the sun broke through. Crowds cheered on the cyclists through the villages evoking the Tour de France spirit.

A quick change at the Macron Stadium before they set off on the final stage a 26.2 mile run through the streets of Bolton finishing on the famous red carpet along Le Mans Crescent.

There were 154 athletes from Bolton taking part, many for the first time. The youngest participant was Boltonian Jordan Stanworth, who turned 18 on race day the oldest was 70 years old. Most athletes were from Great Britain (88%) with 3% from Ireland and 9% from the rest of the world. Most competitors were male with women making up 15% of the start list. Athletes have to complete the event in

Visitors were also able to try their skills on a climbing wall, ride a smoothie bike or have a kick-about on a mini football pitch.

A team of service and ex-service men and women from Royal Bolton Hospital carried a 'tactical advance to battle' by arching from Rivington Pike to Victoria Square.

Billion pound plan for Bolton town

A £1 BILLION masterplan to regenerate Bolton town centre has been unveiled.

The ambitious redevelopment proposals aim to transform the centre and £100m will be funded by the council, with the value of the plan rising to £1bn as private sector partners come on board.

partners come on board.
Work on the huge plan,
which will pull together
a host of sites for development across the town
centre, has been ongoing
for several months.

Once the details are finalised in coming weeks it will be made public, and a report about the masterplan will be considered by the council's Cabinet for approval. It includes land in coun-

It includes land in council ownership and privately owned where there are development proposals or challenges that need to be addressed.

Bolton Council's leadership has revealed that the masterplan will focus on:-

 A more focussed and stronger retail core.

Introducing
town centre housing - focussing on empty and
brownfield sites close the
centre to build high quality housing, including
a mixture of affordable
homes.

- Grade A office development - there is strong demand for office space and a lack of availability locally and regionally. The council will borrow

£100 million over a 50 year period to kick-start different development schemes and it will mean that no cost savings will need to be made to fund the redevelopment.

The loan will involve a repayment at a very low interest rate, which will be paid back using the Manchester Airport dividend and a dividend from the Yorkshire Purchasing Company, which it receives annually.

Areas for development will include the Church Wharf area, at the rear of Bolton Parish Church, and Trinity Street – where a new hotel, office block and a multi-storey car park could be built.

Leader of Bolton Council, Cllr Cliff Morris, said:
"The masterplan is intended to facilitate the redevelopment and growth of our town.

"We know that town centres have changed due to factors such as the shift to online shopping and this masterplan will reflect that.

"It is very important to us that we are able to fund this robustly and be confident that the money we need will not have to be sourced as a result of cuts – we are very pleased that this will be the case.

"We are speaking to a number of developers about different schemes and this is a complex process which can take a lot of time.

We are, however, committed to regenerating Bolton town centre and as soon as possible.

"With the new trans-

port interchange and the investment in electrification, living here if you work in Manchester would be a very good proposition."

New look takes centre stage



CULTURE ATTRACTION: Plans to redevelop the Bolton Octagon Theatre will see it greatly expand

FURTHER information about the plans to transform the Octagon Theatre havebeen announced.

As Bolton Scene was being produced the theatre had submitted a planning application for the refurbishment.

The plans for redevelop-

ment, first announced in January 2015, will be the most comprehensive in its

50 year history.
The building will be enlarged and modernised, which will involve demolishing large sections of the building and rebuilding around the core of the theatre's auditorium. It will:

Be more accessible those with disabilities

· Have more space for young people and community groups

Improve audience com-fort and facilities including air conditioning, seats and toilets.

Have two multi-purpose studio spaces for rehears-als, participation activities and performances.

· and have new revamped

café and bar areas.

The work will start, subject to planning permission, in the middle of 2018 and the theatre will re-open in autumn 2019.

When it is closed the theatre will continue to stage performances in locations around Bolton and there will be a Box Office in the town centre.

Jobs site expands

THE next stage of the Logistics North

development has been announced. The Harworth Group plc has announced a joint venture with the Lancashire County Pension Fund (LCPF) to develop ten new commercial units across 31.2 acres.

It's the seventh deal at Logistics North in the past three years. Most recently Whistl took a ten year lease on a unit, following the likes of Aldi, Lidl, MBDA, and Joy Global.

Councillor Cliff Morris, Leader of Bolton Council, said: "The news that a deal has been finalised to secure even more development and investment at Logistics North

The site is already a huge success with a number of major companies already operating from there and this agreement will bring even more investment to Bolton and provide new jobs for our residents.

"I am confident that there will be other exciting announcements about Logistics North for many months to come.'

LCPF will fund 80% of the acquisition and the development, with Harworth funding the remaining 20%

The new units will be constructed in three separate phases with the first phase due to be completed by December.

New Skoda dealership approved

A major car retailer's plans for a new town centre Skoda dealership have been given the green

At least 30 full-time jobs and five part-time jobs will be created by RRG Group's new state of the art car showroom after the application was given the go-ahead by councillors.

The dealership will now be built at a prime lo-cation on the north side of town, where St Peter's Way and Topp Way meet - a key gateway site into Bolton town centre.

The new development will create a car sales showroom, workshops for servicing, and mezza-nine office space covering 917 square metres.

RRG already undertake service and repairs for Skoda at their site on Bury New Road and this new site will add new and used car sales to their operations.

Giving pupils a good councillors... start to the day



SCHEME to provide children with the most important meal of the day is going down a treat in the borough's primary schools. Last year the council gave more than £250,000 to primary schools so they could start or expand a free breakfast club.

The scheme was so successful that we pledged a further £520,000 in March, in a second round of funding, to enable even more pupils the chance to start the day the right way.

One school, Ladybridge Primary, took the opportunity to use the funding to start up a new free breakfast club, catering for up to 60 pupils at a time.

Headteacher Watson explains the positive impact the new club has had on his pupils: "Having a healthy breakfast means our children are entering the classroom energised, focussed and ready to engage.

Children have a choice of cereal, toast, yoghurt and fresh fruit, with 'treat Friday' offering pancakes or waffles with fresh fruit.

The club runs from 7.30am to 8.50am and as well as a hearty meal, the pupils can enjoy a range of activities, from traditional playground games where they can run around, to using the library and computer suite to assist with homework.

Watson added: Mr "Getting children ready for school in the morning can be stressful and if parents are rushing around. the idea of breakfast can just add to that stress. The breakfast club means that there is one less thing to worry about.

It's also having an impact on children arriving late to class: if they make it

to breakfast club, then they make it to class on time. One mum told us that her children asked could they go to breakfast club the following day.

She replied that they could if they went to bed early. So not only did they eat a healthy breakfast, they got a good night's sleep as well and attended school refreshed the next day.

Mr Watson is grateful for the council funding, which has enabled him to buy equipment and provide the food and games.

"It's a free club for our children, and quite simply, we wouldn't be able to run it without the funding," he

Support for vulnerable young people

THE council is helping some of the most vulnerable in our society.

Young people leaving care aged between 18-21 will receive a 100% discount for council tax. Those care leavers between 22-25 will receive a discount dependent on their circumstances.

Often when care leavers move into independent accommodation, they begin to manage their own budget fully for the first time. Evidence from The Children's Society shows just how challenging care leavers can find managing their own budgets and, in particular, how scary they found falling behind on their council tax.

In interviews undertaken by The Children's Society with young people, they reported that managing

and understanding council tax bills for the first time is frequently a very big challenge for them.

The discount will support their move into independent life.

Do something incredible

CAMPAIGN has been launched to attract more people to become foster carers.

Bolton is one of 23 local authorities backing the #youcanfoster campaign which aims to replace foster carers leaving due to retirement and natural turnover, at the same time as an increase in the numbers of looked after children.

The campaign wants to dispel some of the out-dated misconceptions about children in foster care as well as those around who is eligible to foster - and attract more people to step forward and find out more.

Whether you are older, single or never had children, you can foster.

Bolton currently has more than 280 children and young people in foster placements and this number continues to grow

Bolton needs foster placements for:

- · brothers and sisters including sibling groups of three or more children or young people;
- older children and young people more than half are aged 10 or older;
- long term where children and young people are not be able to live with their own families for a number of years, if at all. Children and young peo-

ple stay in a family where they feel secure, while maintaining contact with their birth family.

· Children with complex or additional needs including behaviour that challenges. There is a need for 'short break' carers -carers providing a variety of different types of parttime care, stays for anything from a few hours each week to a couple of weekends each month, giving their own family or their full time foster carers a break).

The council's Cabinet Member for Education, Schools, Safeguarding and Children, Looked After Councillor Ann Cunliffe,

said: "We are always on the look-out for new foster carers, from all walks of life, and we appreciate those who are able to create a family for our children who need it most. The council can offer a wealth of experience and support to foster families and we encourage people who might be interested to talk to us about the possibilities available.

"We are particularly keen to hear from local residents who can offer a home to local children who are older or are part of a larger sibling group - maybe their own children have grown up and left home and they have space in their home and heart to continue family life with a foster child."

Pearl 56, from Farnworth, who has fostered 20 children during the last 16 years said: "My husband will agree with me when I say that it has been the most challenging but also the most rewarding thing we have ever done. I used to work as a nurse but I decided I wanted to devote my time to fostering and I love it. I enjoy working from home and it doesn't feel like work at all.

"We make the children part of the family and I can't think of anything else that I'd rather do. Initially we did worry about the kinds of chal-lenges we would face, but you get an abundance of information beforehand from social services and there has never been a child that we have said no to. The key is never to be afraid to ask for help or advice if you need it.'



WESTHOUGHTON community college building is now being run by the local community.

They will use it as a meet-

They will use it as a meeting place for local groups and a place to attend a new range of courses.

The deal, which involves the transfer of the building into community ownership, has been arranged by Bolton Council and Bolton College.

Residents want the building to remain open to benefit the community by providing a range of services, such as vocational and non-vocational courses, public services, and a place for local groups to meet and run from. The college has agreed to hand the building back and to work with local councillors and other community representatives to transfer the building into the community.

Officers from the council and the college are now working with ward members, local community groups and Bolton CVS to develop a new constituted group and an action plan to take ideas forward. This will include a consultation exercise with Westhoughton residents to find out more about what they would like to see running from the building.

The college has committed to continue as a tenant in the building.

Happy Birthday

BOLTON Cares, the adult social care company established by Bolton Council is celebrating its first anniversary.

Bolton Cares, which was established in July 2016, is a not-for-profit company that provides a range of care and support for adults in the community including: supported living services; day care; extra care services; short breaks and the shared lives and outreach service

During the last year, the company has grown and now employs around 500 staff. It has also taken on new business and has expanded its day care, extra care services and shared lives services. In March, Bolton Cares was awarded a contract from the council to deliver extra day care services. Bolton Cares has also taken on the running of six new Extra Care schemes across the borough and now looks after a total of over 250 extra care users at 10 locations across the borough.

Moving to a new vision

In 2030 we want Bolton to be a vibrant place built on strong cohesive communities, successful businesses and health, engaged residents. It will be a welcoming place where people choose to study, work, invest and put down roots.

In January the council and our partners came together to discuss improving the borough.

The Vision Partnership includes partners from health, local businesses, schools and colleges, the university, voluntary sector groups, representatives from faith groups and many other bodies.

We are working together to ensure Bolton in 2030 is: Active, Connected, and Prosperous.

Since the conference the partners are coming together under the different themes to plan ahead. It's not all about the council – but how can we help the public to help themselves. A lot of work is taking place under the 'Getting Active' theme with the aim of holding an event on Victoria Square on 25 July to launch this work.

The council is working with Bolton Wanderers Community Trust, Bolton CVS, Bolton Lads and Girls Club, Bolton Arena, Bolton Community Leisure Trust, the University of Bolton, and Greater Sport:

- support the Bolton population to decide to exercise
- enable mass participation and grassroots sporting activity
- target groups known to be inactive

- working with local people – 'doing with' not 'doing to'
- building and strengthening local communities

As well as improving people's health and wellbeing being active:

- Contributes to community cohesion
- reduces social exclusion and isolation
- makes communities feel safer and stronger

The next steps are to look at what is and isn't provided and available at the moment, and to focus on those not taking part in any form of activity.

News from Greater Manchester Combined Authority

This year has seen the election of the first Mayor of Greater Manchester to run the new Greater Manchester Combined Authority.

The authority has received powers and budgets from the government for:

- more control of local transport, with a long-term government budget to help plan a more modern, better-connected network
- control of long-term health and social care spending with a budget £6 billion
- new planning powers to encourage regeneration and development through a new Greater Manchester Land Commission
- a new £300m fund for housing
- extra funding to get up to 50,000 people back into work
- incentives to skills-providers to develop more workrelated training
- extra budget to support and develop local businesses
- the role of the Police and Crime Commissioner has

been merged with the elected mayor with flexibility about criminal justice and offender management.

 control of investment through a new 'earn back' funding arrangement which gives us extra money for the region's infrastructure if we reach certain levels of economic growth

The elected mayor is also responsible for the fire service.

Tackling pollution

CLEAN Air Day aimed to raise awareness of air pollution and how everyone can work to improve air quality.

In Greater Manchester the day was about raising awareness of the problems and plans by the Greater Manchester Combined Authority to tackle them

Up to 2,000 people die prematurely in Greater Manchester each year due to air pollution.

It is estimated that Greater Manchester road transport, particularly diesel vehicles, accounts for 65 per cent of nitrogen oxide and 79 per cent of particulate (dust and soot) emissions

Transport for Greater Manchester (TfGM) and local councils are implementing the policies and measures in Greater Manchester's Low Emission Strategy and Air Quality Action Plan. The plan concentrates on ways to tackle emissions from road transport to improve air quality and reduce carbon dioxide emissions by

- Reducing traffic: for example, by encouraging travellers to switch from cars to use public transport, cycle and walk more;
- Increasing efficiency: improving traffic flow by reducing congestion and stop-start travel to decrease air pollution peaks and to lower emissions overall; and
- Improving fleet: by encouraging the replacement of older, more polluting vehicles with newer, smaller, cleaner, lower-emission vehicles.

New law could ring bus changes

NEW laws will allow the elected Mayor of Greater Manchester to make significant changes to the way bus services are managed.

The Bus Services Act grants combined authorities with an elected mayor, the powers to franchise bus services. This could enable Greater Manchester to create an integrated transport network with a simple fares and ticketing system.

It also means that service quality, branding and customer information could be standardised.

Currently Greater Manchester has a deregulated bus market. This means that private bus operators set their own routes, frequencies, timetables, fares and quality standards for most services. Under a franchised system, such as that used in London, Greater Manchester authorities would take control of bus

service planning, with services run under contract by private operators.

Changes to the way the bus market in Greater Manchester is managed would be subject to a public consultation before any decision was made.

Buses account for 79 per cent of all public transport journeys in Greater Manchester – around 210 million a year. But bus patronage in Greater Manchester has fallen by over 140 million passenger journeys in the last 30 years.





Steaming ahead

SEE some of the north's industrial heritage this August Bank Holiday.

Bolton Steam Museum will be opening its doors to the public for its popular Steam Days. It has the largest collection of working textile mill steam engines in the country. The museum preserves some of the steam engines which powered the textile industries of Lancashire and Yorkshire and is run by volunteers from the Northern Mill Engine

It will be open Sunday and Monday 27 - 28 August, 10am - 4pm. Admission is free but donations can be made to Northern Mill Engine Society.

The museum is located on Morrison's Atlas Mills Supermarket site (next to the petrol station), Mornington Road, Off Chorley Old Road, Bolton,



Kick off for new pitch

Work starts on refurb for Bolton One

WORK has started on a £1m refurbishment of the Jason Kenny Centre at Bolton One.

The refurbishment will include new equipment and new facilities, with the aim of providing high quality, state of the art facilities for Bolton residents.

In the gym, main fitness suite and the free weights room, equipment will be upgraded or replaced with new equipment and the rooms will be refurbished.

The studio and changing rooms will also be refurbished and a new sauna and steam room installed.

The fitness suite has temporarily moved into the University of Bolton Sports Hall in Bolton One. There will be no free weights available and a reduced number of classes will take place in the studio. The changing facilities will also not be available during this period, but members can still change and shower in the swimming changing facilities on the ground floor.

To compensate for the inconvenience to members, all Bolton One memberships will be changed to a walk about membership enabling them to use any of the Bolton leisure centres. Staff at Bolton One will also be available if anyone needs help or advice.

Leader of Bolton Council, Councillor Cliff Morris said: "We are pleased to have started work on this comprehensive refurbishment. Bolton One opened five years ago and it is important that we refurbish it now to keep the facilities and equipment up-to-date for our members and residents.

"We hope that this refurbishment, which will provide high quality facilities at leisure centre prices will attract more people to get involved in sport, as well as improving health and wellbeing across the borough."



Town centre tucks in to amazing selection

We have an amazing line-up of celebrity chefs for this year's Bolton Food and Drink Festival in association with Aldi.

Michelin-starred chef Michael Caines will launch the festival on Friday August 25 before hosting a gala dinner the same night.

Chef and copresenter of Channel 4 Sunday Brunch, Simon Rimmer, will showcase recipes and host a 'Saturday Brunch' event.

He said: "I first came to the festival in 2008 when it was a small scale event but over the years it has grown massively in size and reputation. I can't wait to make a return visit."

He will be performing a live cookery demo and hosting an afternoon tea on the Sunday August 27. He said: "I've always enjoyed visiting Bolton and I've heard great things about this festival - so I can't wait to come back, get stuck in and meet all the fantastic people."

James Martin will notch up his ninth appearance on the Bank Holiday Monday, August 28, the final day of the festival. He said: "I love this festival, the people are so welcoming. I've been doing it for so many years and there is always something new and different to look forward to."

The festival will also feature cookery demos from top regional chefs, a speciality food, drink and crafts market with more than 200 traders, live music, street performers, and children's activities.







Free parking

Free parking in Bolton town centre has been extended until September 2018.

Parking in three NCP multistorey car parks - Octagon, Topp Way and Deane Road – will continue to remain free at weekends and bank holidays for another 14 months.

The announcement comes as new figures show that since free car parking was introduced as a pilot project in 2012, the number of vehicles using the multistorey car parks has risen by 175%

In 2012, 85,873 visitors used the NCP car parks and this figure rose to 236,725 in 2016

The council's partner NCP, who operate the car parks, is implementing the scheme.

University takes flagship building

The University of Bolton

will be moving into Bolton Central; the new flagship building on the corner of Great Moor Street and Newport Street. The university will be the sole occupier of the building which will be used for its new Institute of Management. Construction on the Bolton Central building, at the corner of Great Moor Street and Newport Street, started in December 2015 and completed last month. Two and a half thousand students and over 60 staff will use the five storey building. Staff from the University will begin to occupy the building from next week, with the final classroom layout ready for the new academic year in September.

The Bolton Central building was delivered by PSP Bolton LLP – an innovative public and private sector partnership, comprising Bolton Council and Public Sector Plc.

The work has been carried out by Robertson Construction and local contractors including Lancashire Brick and Tile have also been involved in the project.

Finishing touches to interchange

The finishing touches are

being completed to Bolton's

new interchange. The final building and decoration work is taking place as this edition of Bolton Scene goes to print. The skyling bridge linking the bus and railway stations has been completed. The new Bolton Interchange will provide better passenger information and ticketing facilities and a safer, more secure waiting environment. It will also offer improved links between the town's bus services and rail station, as well as providing a far more attractive 'gateway' to and from the town centre. The transport interchange is being delivered by TfGM in partnership with Bolton Council and Network Rail, and is being funded by the Greater Manchester Transport Fund and will support wider regeneration
