# **Smithills wing** restored to glory

#### WORK to sympathetically restore the west wing of Smithills Hall is now complete.

The Devey Wing, which incorporates the Devey Room, Ainsworth Room and Entrance Hall has been refurbished with many of its original Victorian features restored to their former glory.

Smithills Hall is a 14th Century Grade 1 listed building, with the Devey Wing, designed by Victorian architect George Devey, added later.

Over the years the rooms were adapted for modern use, with original features partitioned off and contemporary light fittings and heating installed. Prior to

the restoration, the room was used as a learning studio for family craft activities and educational visits.

The restoration, carried out by SPIE Ltd in partnership with architects Bradshaw, Gass and Hope LLP, has revealed the original parquet flooring, oak panelling, ornamental ceiling and a beautiful ingle nook fireplace.

It is hoped the room will be used for weddings, conferences and seminars.

Funds for the project were enabled by the sale of land, which forms the nearby Smithills Estate, to The

Woodland Trust in 2015

Cllr Cliff Morris, Leader of Bolton Council said: "Smithills Hall is such a fantastic, historical and well-used building, so it's really good to see it benefiting from a refurbishment which has restored it to its former glory.'

# £1bn council blueprint unveiled

council announced initial details of the plan in July and the authority has since approved borrowing £100m to kick-start the project.

The remainder of the plan will be funded by private sector investors.

The £100 million will be used for a range of priori-ties including site assem-bly; getting sites ready to be developed; public realm improvements, and infrastructure.

It is hoped that work on the first phase of site clear-ance could start as early as

Spring 2018.

The strategy aims to transform key areas of Bolton town centre with housing to attract families, young professionals, older people and students. Some of the main propos-

als include:

• Trinity Quarter - creating a mixed Grade A office and residential development. A new hotel, office block and a multi-storey car park could be built at 'Trinity Gateway'. The council is already in talks with NCP about the car park. A new pedestrian route through Trin-ity Quarter is also pro-posed, anchored by open space via four interlinked squares.

· Cheadle Square - developing housing and apartments on the for-mer bus station site. On Queen Street creating student housing and a mixed used development to complement cultural venues such as the Octagon, Museum and Library, and establishing a pedestrian route be-tween Bolton Town Hall and Le Mans Crescent with Queens Park.

BHS store with an upper floor food court overlooking Victoria Square, exploring the possibility to expand Primark and creating a new pedestrian access between Bradshawgate and Hotel Street.

Church Wharf - Church Wharf would be designated a new town centre 'quarter' with a mix of apartments and town houses, as well as a new pedestrian route along the River Croal.

Valley/Central Street – opening up the River Croal with an im-


proved environment to make it a town centre feature - proposals include building houses and flats which would overlook the improved river frontage. A series of 'pocket parks' are proposed along the

International design company BDP worked with the council to develop the strategy.

The council is borrowing £100m over a 50 year period to kick-start different development schemes and it will mean development that no cost savings will need to be made to fund the redevelopment.

The loan will involve a repayment at a very low interest rate, which will be paid back using the Manchester Airport dividend and a dividend from the Yorkshire Purchasing Company, which it receives annually.

This is not simply looking at one or two compact areas in isolation - it is joined up, strategic planning to transform the town centre for decades to come.

It is part of the huge jigsaw in our town centre regeneration plan, which can be clearly seen already with the new interchange, the improve-ments to Newport Street, our plan to revamp Oxford Street and Knowsley Street, and the support we have given to the fantastic improvements to the Market Place Shopping Centre, with the Vaults and the new cinema.

# **Flytippers fined** for dumping waste

FOUR residents have been taken to court as part of the council's continued crack down on flytipping.

**Bolton Council's Executive Cabinet** Member for Environmental Services, Councillor Nick Peel, said: "Flytipping is antisocial and shows a complete disregard for local people.

"Pursuing prosecutions like these demonstrates the council's continued commitment to deal with those who commit enviro-crime.

# Catching the offenders

Anyone caught flytipping or dumping rubbish now faces a £400 on-the-spot

Previously, the only way the council could deal with flytipping was to take the offenders to court and if the offender did not turn up to court, the case couldn't

Cases of large scale flytipping, or which involve hazardous waste, as well as repeat offenders in flytipping, will continue to be prosecuted through the courts, where culprits face fines of up to £50,000 or a year's jail if convicted.

The council has also invested in two mobile lamppost mounted cameras, to help in the fight against illegal tipping. These will be positioned in known hotspots and will assist the council in identifying and tracking down flytippers, both in daylight and in the dark.

Officers will also be provided with bodycams, which can record conversations with potential offenders, in order to assist in providing evidence for the issuing of fixed penalty notices and any subsequent court cases

Cathy's carers arranged for their friend, a former teacher, to come to the house every week to spend time with her to help her learn to read. Cathy has weekly lessons and spends an hour with her teacher copying passages from books. She is now able to spell her name and is proud of this achievement.

Her speech is clear to people that know her but harder for strangers to understand. The Shared Lives team are currently exploring what technology may help Cathy further with her communication and reading. The carers hope that these new skills will open up other opportunities to help develop her independence and life skills.

voluntary organisations are working together to make sure there are 'no more suicides' in Bolton.

The Bolton Suicide Prevention Partnership is led by representatives from Bolton Council, NHS Bolton Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG), Greater Manchester Mental Health (GMMH) NHS Foundation Trust and the voluntary sector.

It works closely with organisations such schools, housing associations, the emergency services and faith leaders.

Together they agreed that every suicide represents a tragedy for people's families, friends, neighbours and colleagues and that every suicide has the potential to be prevent-

As a result, the partnership has made a collective commitment to do all they can to work towards achieving no more suicides in Bol-

They have produced a suicide prevention strategy which sets out the action they will take to achieve their goal.

It was launched to the public and interested partners on World Mental Health Day last month.

Bolton's suicide rate has recently fallen in recent years and, on average, there are around 26 incidences a year.

majority among white males, and the average age during the past 12 months was 42 years.

Twice as many suicides occur in the most deprived areas and there are a range of risk factors including a history of mental health problems; a history of selfharm; living alone; a history of violence; alcohol and drug misuse; and being unemployed.

The strategy contains a

number of key priorities to:

- identify high risk groups and implement action to reduce risk:
- identify and support people who may become vulnerable due to specific life events:
- improve mental health support, and
- develop suicide preven-tion training for frontline workers who come into contact with those at risk.

In addition, the strategy highlights the need to work with the media to encourage sensitive reporting of suicide and to improve the way organisations share information.

Chairman of the Health and Wellbeing Board and Deputy Leader of the Council, Cllr Linda Thomas, said: "It may seem ambitious that our aim is for no more suicides in Bolton, but we are truly committed to work together to achieve this.

"We are not saying we can achieve this in a certain number of years but from this day forward, we will do everything we can to help people change their opinion

that suicide is an option. "Every life lost to suicide represents a personal trag-edy and we believe that, with the correct support in place, early identification of risk factors and a strong partnership approach, there is the potential to prevent this from happening.

"Suicide has a devastating effect on families, friends, colleagues and people who work in certain services. It is in everyone's interest to try and reduce the number of suicides in Bolton, and it feels natural to want to see an end to this tragic loss of life altogeth-

The partnership intends to develop a public campaign to raise awareness of the need to reduce suicide and will closely monitor progress of the strategy.

The You Can Foster campaign is encouraging more people to come forward and foster for their local authority. In Bolton we really need more foster carers, especially for siblings and teenagers.

As well as providing a loving home for children and young people in care fostering can be rewarding for carers too.

Sean and Karen had previously fostered for a private agency but transferred to Bolton because they felt that only a Local Authority could offer them the professional support they needed when fostering teenage boys.

Sean recalls the first time he took a foster child into his house and says that it was really strange, no mistake, but after the first couple of weeks it became totally natural.

It's the one thing most people ask me when they're thinking about fostering," he says. "What it feels like to bring someone new into your house. I understand why they're asking but honestly you don't notice after a while. I think becoming a foster carer has made me a more patient person and that's a great thing.

"I think I must have been very impatient when I was younger," he laughs. "I'm not now, that's for sure."

"If I was to offer one piece of advice to a new carer it would be to make sure that you make the young person a genuine member of the family," says Sean. "Once you do that there is no longer a stranger in your home, and you're building up trust with someone who's probably had very little trust in their life. It really does make all the difference. I know it has with us and the teenagers we've looked after.





# Working together for a Better Bolton

There have been some exciting developments in Bolton recently.

As part of Bolton's plan for better health and social care we have pledged to make changes to the services you receive.

# We want to:

- Use technology to improve patient care.
- Improve Bolton's care homes as well as the social care provided in people's homes.

# Care Home Excellence

The quality of life for residents in care homes is set to improve further through the Care Home Excellence programme.

34 of our 36 older peoples care homes have signed up and committed to making improvements in return for support from the Council and Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG).

The 'Red Bag' initiative, which has just been launched, is a small change which will hopefully have a big impact on home care residents when they do need to go to hospital. The red bag will go with the resident to hospital and stay with them until they

return home providing a highly visible way of identifying someone as a care home resident as well as somewhere for their personal items such as glasses or dentures to be kept safe. The bag has been used successfully in other areas and is proven to reduce the length of stay in hospital.

Residents and their families are also being asked what would improve their quality of life. Suggestions are being put forward to the Care Home Excellence Innovation Fund and we hope to have the first projects off the ground very soon. Bids include things like creating sensory gardens, providing community space so residents can interact with community groups more easily and creating reminiscence spaces and materials.

# **Telemedicine** in Care Homes

Telemedicine is a service that is being introduced to support recent care homes changes. The service has been designed especially to support older people's residential care and nursing homes, and to help frail elderly residents to "live well".

The service is provided by "Immedicare" which is a partnership between Airedale NHS Foundation Trust and technology experts, Involve.

Each care home will be provided with a laptop, which is used to make video calls to experienced Care Nurses who use the video link to carry out an assessment of a resident's condition.

The new service will be accessible 24 hours a day, seven days a week and there's more still to come! Keep your eyes peeled for more details of the new and innovative ways we are working to support you to live a longer and healthier life.

# **Bolton Care Record**

In September the eagerly anticipated Bolton Care Record, the new confidential computer record that will allow health and care professionals to access up to date information about you, was rolled out to nine GP practices in the Bolton area as part of what we call the 'early adopters' phase.

After intense testing data has started flowing from these practices. Meaning 30% of Bolton's population now have a digital care record.

Previously, patients at these practices had to repeat their information to health and social care professionals where no patient history has been available on a digital basis. Now a digital summary including previous test results, medication history, GP and hospital appointments can all be instantly viewed when permission is given.

Dr Simon Irving – Consultant Acute Physician at the Royal Bolton Hospital Foundation Trust, said "There has been real enthusiasm and excitement from staff. There is a wealth of information to which we haven't previously been able to see. The more GPs that come on board, the greater the chance of the patient having a shared care record that we can access to check vital information.'


"Paddy is a local lad who has really put Bolton on the map and we're really pleased that he still comes back regularly to visit.





# Westhoughton gets keys for new building

# Rail station upgrades

WORK to improve a number of rail stations across Greater Manchester is taking place.

Twenty-five stations, including Hall i'th'Wood, Bromley Cross, Lostock, and Horwich Parkway, will see customer information screens, public address systems, CCTV cameras, help points and induction loops installed.

Some stations will also see tactile paving installed on the platform edges to make platforms safer for passengers with a visual impairment.

The £2.4m works, funded by Transport for Greater Manchester (TfGM) as part of its Rail Station Improvement Strategy (RSIS), are set to be completed by early summer next year.

# Street works Car park

IMPROVEMENTS to the way Knowsley Street and Oxford Street look have been approved.

The works are aimed to complement the work taking place to Newport Street. They will include:

- Stone paving and granite kerbs, incorporating drainage, along both sides of the street creating a level footway and removing any trip hazards;
- The introduction of some short stay on street parking bays;
- Bollards to avoid overrunning by cars in the parking bays, A new loading bay to serve the
- Market Place;
- · Removal of the phone kiosks and

- replacement on Oxford Street;
- · Removal or replacement of columns on Oxford Street
- Introduction of new seating along the Market Place façade;
- Additional cycle stands;
- Trees to replace those that are required to be removed as part of the scheme and
- Space for units in the Market Place to have outdoor seating

Any utility work such as electrical work is likely to take place be-fore Christmas with the main work starting on Knowsley Street early

PLANS for a new multi-storey car park, which will serve Bolton Interchange, have taken a step closer.

The council's parking partner, NCP, has been approached to submit designs for a suitable building at the Trinity Gateway site as part of the council's Town Centre

Trinity Gateway comprises land bounded by Trinity Street, Bradshawgate and the Bolton to Blackburn railway line (Bolton-Blackburn).

The precise siting and design of the car park building will be finalised prior to submission of a planning application.

There will be a pedestrian route to Trinity Street to facilitate the shortest route to

the Interchange entrance.
Funding for the car park will come from the £100 million budget the council has approved to kickstart a further £1 billion of private investment

# Cranberry Turkey Pasties

500g pack shortcrust pastry
200g leftover roast turkey, diced
2 tbsp cranberry sauce
6 leftover stuffing balls, roughly chopped (140g)
50g low fat soft cheese
75g frozen peas, defrosted
1 medium egg, beaten

#### Method

- Preheat the oven to 200°C, gas mark 6
- Roll out the pastry and cut 6 x 17cm (7") circles
- Mix together the turkey, cranberry sauce, stuffing, soft cheese and peas and divide between the pastry circles. Brush the pastry edges with egg. Bring the edges up and press to seal well to form a pasty shape
- Place the pasties on a baking tray, sealed edges facing up and brush with the egg.
   Bake for 20-25 minutes until golden

# Bubble and Squeak

1 red onion, finely chopped
450g leftover mashed potato
300g leftover mixed cooked vegetables e.g.
roast parsnips, green beans, Brussel sprouts,
cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, broccoli or peas,
chopped into small pieces
Salt and black pepper
25g hard cheese, grated
25g butter, melted
Plain flour

#### Method

- Heat the oil in a frying pan and cook the finely chopped onion for 4-5 minutes until soft
- Remove the pan from the heat and transfer the onions into a large bowl
- Add the mashed potato and cooked vegetables, season well. Add the cheese, mix well and divide the mixture into six portions
- Using your hands, shape each portion into a cake. Put a little flour on a plate and coat each cake in flour on both sides
- Put onto a greased baking tray and brush with a little melted butter. Bake in a preheated oven (200°C/400°F/gas mark 6) for 25 minutes or fry on both sides until golden brown
