

Vision for town...

She said: "To improve prosperity in the borough we've secured £100m to drive forward the changes that residents want to see in Bolton town centre.

"It's also about restoring the vibrancy of our other town centres, such as Farnworth, which is a top priority for me.

The council announced last year it will borrow £100m to kick-start different development schemes as part of a £1 billion masterplan to regenerate Bolton town centre. The ambitious redevelopment proposals aim to transform the centre.

Areas for development will include Church Wharf, and Trinity Street – where a new hotel, office block and a multi-storey car park could be built.

Strengths

The new chief executive of Bolton Council, Tony Oakman, said he was delighted to be working in Bolton.

"Bolton was a place I wanted to come to and I already feel like part of the Bolton family. It is the people in this town that make it such a special place and we need to be positive about the borough's strengths.'

At the recent Vision Conference, Tony spoke of the need to mobilise the borough in celebrating its strengths and rising to the challenges, by working together.

"This is a place I wanted to come and work in, because of the vision, where the borough is heading and because of the people. People make places. Everywhere I've been everyone has been very welcoming, everyone has been very positive, people want to make you listen to what they want

to see happen. "That's not to say that there are not things that we need to improve, or that we can build

"But negativity gets us nowhere. We can all talk about what's not right. But actually the brave people are those that stand up for the things that need to happen, stand up for the things that need to change, and importantly talk help shape and improve things. "I want to work with you as Chief Execu-

tive of this council to shape, to inform and to work in partnership. As a council we can't do it on our own, but by listening, by understanding, by sometimes agreeing or disagreeing, we come to an agreement about what our key policies are and what we need to do."

Councillor Thomas added: "Some of you have asked how can we deliver with less and innovate in the face of austerity. Narrowing gap underpins everything we do and it's what I'm personally been committed to my whole life.

"We're pushing forward our anti-poverty support offer, the most generous in Greater Manchester. So far we have secured more than £2 million to help our most vulnerable residents who are really struggling.

Church Wharf plans next steps




DEVELOPMENT PLAN: The river Croal could become a major feature

The You Can Foster campaign is encouraging more people to come forward and foster for their local authority. In Bolton we really need more foster carers, especially for siblings and teenagers.

As well as providing a loving home for children and young people in care fostering can be rewarding for carers too.

Sean and Karen had previously fostered for a private agency but transferred to Bolton because they felt that only a Local Authority could offer them the professional support they needed when fostering teenage boys.

Sean recalls the first time he took a foster child into his house and says that it was really strange, no mistake, but after the first couple of weeks it became totally natural.

It's the one thing most people ask me when they're thinking about fostering," he says. "What it feels like to bring someone new into your house. I understand why they're asking but honestly you don't notice after a while. I think becoming a foster carer has made me a more patient person and that's a great thing.

"I think I must have been very impatient when I was younger," he laughs. "I'm not now, that's for sure."

"If I was to offer one piece of advice to a new carer it would be to make sure that you make the young person a genuine member of the family," says Sean. "Once you do that there is no longer a stranger in your home, and you're building up trust with someone who's probably had very little trust in their life. It really does make all the difference. I know it has with us and the teenagers we've looked after.

£1 billion boost for town centre

Since the council launched the £1bn town centre masterplan last year we've busy working behind the scenes to make progress.

The first steps are starting to take shape. The council has borrowed $\pounds100m$ to kick start a further planned $\pounds1bn$ investment from the private sector in the town centre up to 2030 and beyond.

The masterplan looks at:

A more focused and stronger retail core.
Introducing town centre housing focusing on empty and brownfield sites close to the centre to build high quality housing, including a mixture of affordable homes. • Grade A office development - there is strong demand for office space and a lack of availability locally and regionally.


Redevelopment will include creating 1800 new homes, 7400 new jobs and generating economic activity worth an additional £412m over five strategic sites.

The latest news is that a planning document for to guide the development of the Church Wharf area has been drafted. Church Wharf will be a new town centre 'quarter' with a mix of apartments and town houses, as well as having a new pedestrian route along the River Croal. Plans for a new multi-storey car park near Bolton transport interchange have taken another step forward.

The former Wayne Walker meat store and the adjacent Motorcycle Mega Store at the junction with Trinity Street and Bradshawgate will be demolished. A planning application for the multi-storey car park is expected to be submitted soon after.

The Trinity Gateway scheme also includes proposal for a hotel and offices.

Best Bar None



A new project is tackling town centre problems.

Violent crime has fallen by 33% in licensed premises following the

launch of a new project.

Best Bar None is a nationally recognised scheme to improve standards within licensed premises, reduce problems and address vulnerability.

The Bolton scheme was launched in 2017 with 17 venues signing up. The standards are scored Bronze, Silver and Gold awards with venues having three months to reach the required standards. All premises scored above the required Bronze standard with the majority being awarded Silver and several more receiving Gold. One of the venues stood out more than the others (Level Nightclub) and achieved a special Platinum award.

To be accredited each premise was subject to an intensive process by an independent assessor and had to demonstrate competence and present their policies and procedures in relation to various elements of their operations. Workshops and training

Workshops and training sessions around child

sexual exploitation and counter terrorism were delivered. The workshops and training sessions were well attended with 40-50 staff from licensed premises coming along.

Last November Best Bar None (Bolton) launched the 'Ask for Angela' scheme. Any person who finds themselves in a vulnerable position can be safely and discretely removed from any potential danger.

During the Christmas period #ask Angela was activate on five occasions in two venues preventing some potentially very serious incidents.

All accredited venues embraced the scheme and a number of them are going to be part of the new Student Safe Zone.

This year the scheme is expected to grow to approximately 24 premises. Westhoughton town centre has seen the positive impact of what has happened in Bolton and a scheme will be launched in the town.



Fall in love with lunch



Often overlooked or under thought, lunch can be the forgotten meal.

Ingredients - serves 4

- 3 tsp olive oil
- 500g Yellowfin tuna steak
- 450g mixed tomatoes
- 1 handful large flat-leaf
- parsley
- 1 garlic clove
- 2 tbsp balsamic vinegar
- 1 tbsp capers
- 1 loaf crusty bread

Method

Half the mixed tomatoes, or slice if large - we used a mixture of red and gold santini, rosa, green tiger and jester. Finely chop the garlic cloves. Drain the capers. Heat 1 tbsp of the oil in a large, non-stick frying pan. Season the tuna steaks and add to the pan. Cook for 2-3 minutes each side, so that the tuna is rare in the centre.

Remove the fish from the pan and cut it into chunky pieces.

Arrange on a platter with the tomatoes and parsley.

Add the remaining oil to the pan, with the garlic.

Sizzle for a minute, remove from the heat and stir in the balsamic vinegar and capers.

Spoon over the tuna and tomatoes, and serve with crusty bread.



Charity awarded nearly £500K lottery grant

A HOUSING scheme that supports young people has been awarded a lottery grant to help them into the world of work.

Bolton Young Persons Housing Scheme (BYPHS) was awarded a Big Lottery Reaching Communities Grant of nearly half a mil-Communities lion pounds.

The organisation will now use the cash for its 'Chances' project, which supports young people aged 16 to 25. They have already been homeless and are living in the scheme's temporary accommodation but are continuing to struggle.

The young people may also have experienced a range of issues including mental ill health, sexual exploitation and domestic abuse.

The lottery grant will now ensure that the council is able to continue to offer children in its care a range of work experience op-portunities and enhanced routes into employment.

New community facilities in Blackrod

NEW sports and community activities are available in Blackrod.

The Blackrod Sports and Community Centre has been taken over by the community, as a meeting place for local groups.

Local people have set up the Blackrod Sports & Community Centre CIC (Community Interest Company) to manage and maintain the building. The council awarded them an £80,000 grant from its Community Empowerment Fund, for a new roof for the centre and some internal modifications to the building.

The community interest company aims to increase use of the centre and pitches by local community and sports groups and provide activities for all members of the Blackrod community.

Chris Essex-Crosby, Chair of Blackrod Sports and Community Centre CIC said: "As trustees, we are proud to take on the management of the Blackrod Sports & Community Centre. We are grateful for the confidence shown in us by Bolton Council."

£12 million boost for **Rivington Chase**

A NEW access road to the £262m Rivington Chase development will enable much needed homes can be built more quickly.

The council has been awarded £12m million to create the new road. The money will also be used for works to the land which the road will be built on.

It will provide the main access to vehicles for Rivington Chase and will link the planned 1700 home site with Middlebrook retail park, Horwich Parkway railway station, and junction 6 of the M61.

The government funding is to support local infrastructure to make housing developments viable and accelerate housing delivery.

Leader of Bolton Council, Cllr Linda Thomas, said: "This is great news and we always promised we would address local residents' concerns about access to the site and how any extra vehicles in the area would be catered for.

"We understood that the local community had concerns about highways infrastructure, and we said this would have to be in place before any houses are built.

"The level of investment proposed in the whole scheme will result in major direct fi-nancial investment into Horwich, which will benefit both the town and the whole borough.

'Work on the site will also bring hundreds of new jobs for the community."



Flytipping action

THE council is taking action against those who flytip.

We have taken the following cases to court: • Stephen Millar was

sentenced to 12 month conditional discharge and almost £1000 after he dumped chip board, waste bags, glass and cardboard behind his home.

- Jozef Bihari was fined £890 for repeatedly leaving waste in his backyard which the council had to clear.
- Lisa Marie Sutton failed to remove a corner sofa, a double mattress, bed-

ding, stinking black bags and other rubbish from her rear yard and was fined $\pounds712$.

Carmen Tomescu failed to pay on the spot fines after she left a fridge, and 12 black bin bags of rubbish behind her house and was fined £1132 by the court. • Sandor Zeno Hovarth was fined £770 for leaving a sofa, a chair, chipboard, clothes and other waste behind his house.

Ladislav Bihari left a single mattress leaning against the wall of his backyard and was fined was fined £620. TWO services which enable people with disabilities to live either independently or with a carer have passed inspections with flying col-

Inspectors from the Care Quality Commission (CQC) judged the Shared Lives service and the Supported Living service to be 'Good' in all five categories: safe, effective, caring, responsive and well-led. Their overall judgement was that the services were 'Good'. These services are run by Bolton Council's local authority trading company, Bolton Cares.

People who use the Supported Living service live in a shared tenanted accommodation where staff assist them to live independently, while Shared Lives enables adults with disabilities to live with a carer as part of a family environment.

Inspectors spoke to people who use the services, their relatives, and the staff and managers.

The Council intends to make an order which will enable the following events to take place in Horwich on dates as indicated:

RIVINGTON PIKE FELL RACES

Between approximately 2pm and 4.30pm on Saturday 31 March, Lever Park Avenue will be closed from Scholes Bank to Dryfield Lane.

The alternative route for traffic will be: Scholes Bank - Dryfield Lane.

A DAY FOR ST GEORGE

Between approximately 11am and 2.30pm on Saturday 21 April, Brownlow Road will be closed from Lee Lane for approximately 30m in a north-easterly direction (the area of carriageway adjacent to the Saddle Public House).


centre before ascending through Queens Park to Chorley New Road.
