THE new woman Leader of Bolton Council, Cllr Linda Thomas unveiled a memorial to Mary Barnes OBE, to commemorate the Farnworth suffragist and campaigner for equal rights and 100 years since women were allowed to vote.

Also pictured at the unveiling are the family of Mary Barnes with members of the Farnworth community and councillors who organised the memorial and a family fun day.

The Representation of People Act gave the vote to women over 30 who held £5 or property or had husbands who did, and all men over 21 years old.

E16m school

MORE than 1000 secondary school places are set to be created as part of a £16 million expansion plan.

Bolton Council is working with seven schools in the borough to expand their capacto expand their capac-ity due to increasing Year 7 places will be cre-

demand for places as large numbers of primary school pupils progress and transfer into secondary schools. Turton HS is already increasing its capacity having admitted additional pupil numbers last year.

ated, equating to 1,145 secondary places overall to accommodate rising numbers of Year 7 to Year 11 pupils.

In addition to Turton, the following schools have now agreed to create extra classroom space, Canon Slade, Sharples Academy, Thornleigh Salesian, Essa Academy, Ladybridge, St Joseph's RC, and Westhoughton. The council, working with Diocesan and Academy partners, is being allowed to draw upon its funding allocation up to 2020 by the Department for Education.

The council is also proposing to increase primary school places where demand is high and is currently consulting with local primary schools to explore opportunities to create additional capacity. This could result in the creation of over 400 additional primary school places at a cost of around £4.5 million, by drawing upon future funding from the Department for Educa-

While there are presently enough places for Reception age children who require a school place, it is expected that demand will increase for older primary age pupils.

The council still requires an extra £1m to cover all places as £1m has already been used to increase extra special needs places.

What your council tax has to pay for Message


NO one likes receiving a bill, but it helps if you know how your money is being spent. council funds a wide range of services that we all rely on throughout our lives such as:


- · Caring for children, the elderly and other vul-nerable people including those disabilities
- · Children's services, such as schools, children's centres, before and after school clubs and youth services
- · Maintaining and repairing roads and bridges
- · Leisure facilities including swimming pools, sports centres and parks
- · Providing libraries and art galleries
- Keeping Bolton's streets clean

Part of the council tax you pay also goes to the Greater Manchester Police and Crime and Fire and Rescue services

Some money is also paid out to other organisations such as the Passenger Transport and Waste Disposal Authorities.


The charts right shows how much money goes to each service per year if you live in a Band A or Band D property, for example. But no matter which Band you are in the percentage going to each service is the same






Where does the council's money come from?

Money from council tax is only part of the council's budget. The council also gets money as a grant from the government and from business rates but does not decide how much is set. From 2017/18 the council is able to keep all of the business rates gathered in the borough, and by 2020 government funding will have reached zero.

More jobs to largest site in North West

FURTHER jobs have been secured for the Logistics North site in Bolton.

Hardscape Products Ltd will become the latest occupier of a unit at the site, expanding from its current base in Bolton.

It is the latest in a series of new tenants – in February developers Harworth announced that it had agreed leases with Northern Building Plastics Limited and Vaclensa Limited for and units.

They were here as part of a nationwide tour to find four sites to help with the airport's expansion.

The manufacturing and distribution site in Over Hulton, owned by Harworth Group plc, was put forward as a possible construction centre for the new runway.

Later this year all the sites in the running will go through a further process to find the most suitable sites.

The expansion project is expected to deliver up to £16bn in economic benefits and 15,300 jobs across the North West.

Can you do something incredible and help a local child in foster care achieve their ambition?

The You Can Foster campaign is encouraging more people to come forward and foster for their local authority. In Bolton we really need more foster carers, especially for siblings and teenagers.

As well as providing a loving home for children and young people in care fostering can be rewarding for carers too.

Sean and Karen had previously fostered for a private agency but transferred to Bolton because they felt that only a Local Authority could offer them the professional support they needed when fostering teenage boys.

Sean recalls the first time he took a foster child into his house and says that it was really strange, no mistake, but after the first couple of weeks it became totally natural.

It's the one thing most people ask me when they're thinking about fostering," he says. "What it feels like to bring someone new into your house. I understand why they're asking but honestly you don't notice after a while. I think becoming a foster carer has made me a more patient person and that's a great thing.

"I think I must have been very impatient when I was younger," he laughs. "I'm not now, that's for sure."

"If I was to offer one piece of advice to a new carer it would be to make sure that you make the young person a genuine member of the family," says Sean. "Once you do that there is no longer a stranger in your home, and you're building up trust with someone who's probably had very little trust in their life. It really does make all the difference. I know it has with us and the teenagers we've looked after.





Chorley New Rd School opens in September



WORK is progressing at pace on the site of the new Chorley New Road primary school in Horwich.

Bolton Council is working with Wilmott Dixon to build a modern, larger school which is due to open this September. Once the new-build is completed, the old school which sits next to it will be demolished.

The decision to build a new school was made in response to the need for extra primary school places in the area to accommodate families from the Rivington Chase housing development, which will be built on the site of the former Horwich Loco Works.

The school can currently accommodate 315 pupils and has a one-form entry of 45 pupils.

The new school will become two-form entry with a view to increasing its capacity to 420 pupils in order to meet the demand of additional residents in future years.

Construction is expected to be completed by August, and pupils will be welcomed into their new school from September 10.

New look

A £995,000 regeneration programme to enhance the town centre is underway.

Work has started on the redevelopment

Work has started on the redevelopment project which will see new paving, street lighting and trees installed on Knowsley Street. New trees will also be planted along Oxford Street.

An additional short stay parking bay will also be created on Knowsley Street, opposite The Market Place Shopping Centre - to help shoppers and visitors coming to the town centre.

The Knowsley Street bus lane has also been closed to enable the work to take place.

The whole scheme is expected to be complete by the summer and follows redevelopment work on Newport Street undertaken by the council.

Refurbishment fit for future

WESTHOUGHTON Town Hall is to refurbished.

The multi-million pound project will look to continue to preserve and enhance the Market Street building to ensure that it can continue to act as a base for important local services for many years to come.

Work will include improvements to the heating, ventilation and lighting within the building.

It is anticipated that the building, which is currently home to Westhoughton Town Council, will continue to be occupied throughout the refurbishment period.

Farnworth's suffrage centenary celebrations

During her 40 years' service to Farnworth Mary Elizabeth Barnes OBE, JP, was the first woman councillor for Farnworth and was elected in 1922. She was a local magistrate and chairman and representative on a number of committees, including Bolton Women

Citizens Association which was formerly Bolton Suffrage Society. The Barnes family, which Mary married into, donated land to the local community which is now Farnworth Park and in 1918 an Ash tree was planted there in her honour.

CELEBRATIONS by Bolton Council and Farnworth community representatives marked 100 years since the vote was given to women.

It received £34,500 from the Government Equalities Office Centenary Cities Grant Fund.

In the run up to the event, Farnworth Library screened educational films about the suffragettes and events for young people themed about 'an inspirational woman in your life' or 'a suffragette in your family'.

As a lasting legacy and to remember all those who champion equal rights, a Mary Barnes Inspirational Woman of Farnworth Award was launched which recognises women who are exceptional role models and who are making a positive impact on the local community.

New Mayor takes up office

THE environment and ecology are dear to the heart of the new Mayor, Cllr Elaine Sherrington.

In her executive role a few years ago in Recycling and Waste she was known as the 'bin lady' and her well known saying was 'reduce, reuse, recycle'

During her year of office celebrations will take place to mark the end of the First World War, and also the 100th Anniversary of the Representation of the People Act 1918.

The act gave the vote to all men over 21 years of age, and women over 30 who have property over £5 or if they are were married their husbands had £5 or over in property.

"It was the start of democracy for ordinary people and the beginnings of equality," said Cllr Sherrington.

In her Mayoral Year Cllr Sherrington would also like to remember the work of mill workers, who were fundamental in the development of the town. She worked as a weaver for a few years and she said Bolton's success was built on the backs of mill workers and led to the development of other industries.

When she married at 20 she moved away from Bolton to have a family. She returned in 1979 to run the Busin and Sundowners nightclubs. The Busin had an early night on a Tuesday which was Bolton's only punk rock club. This was run by Prav and Dill who were collecting funds for the Socialist Workers Party.

In 1984 she opened up her first residential home, and she ran nursing and residential homes until 1993.

In the years that followed she looked after her elderly relatives.

Cllr Sherrington was always a keen supporter of the Labour party and after having stood unsuccessfully in Bromley Cross in 1998, she was elected to serve the old Tonge ward in 1999. After re-organisation this ward became the Tonge with the Haulgh ward in 2004 which she has continued to serve up until today.

She has been the cabinet member for Housing and Anti-Poverty from 2017/18 Cabinet member for Housing, Highways and Procurement 2015/17

ment 2015/17.
She was Vice-Chair of Greater Manchester Waste 2013/15.

She was Executive Member for Cleaner, Greener, Safer 2011/12 Adult Services from 2009/11; Cleaner, Greener, Safer 2008/9, and Recycling and Waste Management 2006/8.

She has also been a governor at several schools since 1987. She has been Chair of Governors at Moorgate for the last 10 years and has seen it grow in size to become an outstanding school.

Cllr Sherrington's charities for the year will be Bolton Lads and Girls Club, Bolton Hospice, the Young Persons Housing Scheme and Fortalice.

Councillor Sherrington said 'It is both an honour and privilege to have been asked to be Mayor. I will do my best to uphold the duty that so many excellent Mayors have done before me.'

BOLTON'S services for some of the borough's most vulnerable people are celebrating after a continuous run of positive government inspection reports.

The Extra Care housing service provided by Bolton Cares was recently rated as good following an inspection by the Care Quality Commission (CQC).

This followed hot on the heels of good ratings for both the Shared Lives and Supported Living services which are also run by Bolton Cares.

Earlier this year, both Mere Hall View, which provides short break care for adults with learning difficulties, and The Respite House, which provides short break care for adults with mental health issues, were also rated as 'good'.

In all five reports, staff were singled out for praise by the CQC, service users and their relatives.

Bolton Cares is a notfor-profit company, wholly owned by the council, which provides a range of care and support for adults in the community including: supported living services, outreach, disability day care, older adults' day care, extra care services, short break care, and the shared lives service.

Theatre funding boost

THE multi-million pound redevelopment of Bolton's Octagon Theatre has received a £450,000 boost from six local, national and regional charities.

The Foyle Foundation and the Garfield Weston Foundation have each donated £100,000.

The £9.87 million Octagon Reimagined project will expand and refurbish the theatre, improve access and extend its community work.

The Wolfson Foundation has pledged £50,000 and Bolton's Sir James & Lady Scott Trust has given £30,000. These are added to donations totalling £145,000 from The Oglesby Charitable Trust and The Granada Foundation.

The grants are the latest to the theatre's capital appeal to raise £1.5 million towards the £9.87 million total.

£431.8m from Bolton's tourism

BOLTON'S tourism industry generated £431.8m for the town the latest available figures show.

The 2016 results are a 2.7% increase on the previous year's figure of £420.4m.

The figures are the latest available and have been researched by the Scarborough Tourism Economic Activity Monitor (STEAM). It uses a range of data sources including: hotel occupancy rates; surveys, and visitor figures.

The growth is also attributed to popular attractions such as Bolton Museum, Aquarium and Archive which was in the top ten most visited attractions in Greater Manchester.

- The Bolton Food and Drink Festival - 260,000 visitors.
- Ironman UK Triathlon and Ironkids - more than £3m to local economy.
- Bolton Museum, Aquarium and Archive in Top 10 most visited in Greater Manchester.
- The Octagon Theatre, Bolton's historic halls -Smithills Hall and Hall i'th'Wood, and Moorgarth's £23m transformational refurbishment of the Market Place Shopping Centre have also drawn visitors into the town centre.
- Bolton also has a good supply of hotels and bed and breakfasts which attract visitors throughout the year.


